TRAVEL FROZEN

All civilian travel is being frozen from Dec. 12, 1943 to Jan. 12, 1944, according to Santa Fe railroad officials who visited Poston last week. The army is scheduled to use every available car for the transportation of soldiers during the holiday season and project departures will be curtailed except as follows:

(1) Special car, Nov. 20, east via Santa Fe railroad to Kansas Ci-

ty and Chicago.

(2) Departure to Bar stow, Dec. 2, north via Santa Fe and Union Pacific railroads to Salt Lake.

(3) Special car, Dsc. 10, east, same as (1). (4) Special car,

Jan. 4, east, same as (1) and (3).

Morning departures will be held to a mini mum of 4 daily, and emergency departures will be considered and sent out at the discretion of W. Allen Cushman, Leave Officer head, but there is no guarantee that departes will be able to get out of Wickenburg. (cont. on page 2)

242,224 POUNDS OF VEGETABLES GROWN BY AG.

A total of \$8266.68 worth of fresh produce were grown and deliver ed to the Subsistence Dept. by the Unit I Ag. Dept.during the period of Sept. 27 to Nov.12, the department reports

Vegetables harvested and delivered included: shiro-uri, 75,365 lbs.; nappa, 52,765 lbs.; eggplant, 46,075 lbs.; daikon, 57,531 lbs.; daikon, 57,531 lbs.; Armenian cukes, 7,450 lbs., and Sasage beans, 3,038 lbs. The total amount produced is reported to be 242,224 lbs.

In addition to the above items, 300,000 pounds or more vegetables such as sweet potatoes, broccoli, daikon, nappa, spinach, and peanuts are to be harvested before the end of the year.

Furthermore, to assure fresh vegetable supplies for the coming spring, seeding has been started.

A Red Cross Club to carry on such Activiaties has been owanized in the sixth grade una der the sponsorship of Miss Tamura.




