

TEMPORARY HOUSING IN MIDWEST SEEN

Persons who intend to relocate to the Chicago area may find temporary housing at the combined Brethren and Friends hostel which will open Dec. 1 at 6118 N. Sheridan Road.

The new enlarge hostel is capable of accommodating as many guests as the old separate hostels previously did according to word received here from the mid-west branch of the American Friends Service Committee.

The Cleveland Cincinnati and Des Moines hostels will continue as before.

Future residents of Detroit will also be provided temporary housing in a new hostel which has been established by the local Council of Churches there, with Mrs. Alice Field as supervisor. Invitations will be issued to those who have introductions from a Protestant clergyman in the relocation center. (cont. on page 2)

REHEARINGS SLATED IN SANTA FE

The Hearing Board is scheduled to meet at Santa Fe starting Nov. 29 and all internees whose families reside in a Relocation Center will either be given a rehearing or their case will be reviewed

by the Enemy Alien Control Unit the Dept. of Justice informed the WRA. The Washington WRA office stated in a letter to the Family Welfare Office.

It is the WRA's understanding that the policy of the Dept. of Justice is to grant interim parole only in cases of emergency.

In another letter the WRA stated that they reiterate the policy to reunite families whenever possible.

After the hearings and reviews mentioned plans will be made according to individual circumstances.

Those paroled or released will join their families at relocation centers or at their homes where the families have relocated. In the case of families who are to be segregated consideration will be given to the possibility of both the intern and his family being moved to Tule Lake. Segregated families who cannot be reunited with the interned member at Tule Lake as well as non-segregated families will still be considered for admission to Crystal City.

EXAMINER'S VERSION OF BILL OF RIGHTS

The Los Angeles Examiner is campaigning, among other things, for a Bill of Rights week, so that the 152nd anniversary this year of the signing of the Charter of Liberty may be properly honored.

We think this is a worthy idea. It is a noble, fine, good and beautiful thing that the Examiner is doing.

We have just finished reading the Examiner's version of the Bill of Rights, "couched in the simplest of terms." We think it is a pretty good condensation.

We will never forget, as the Examiner so emphatically states, that "The Bill of Rights is the SOUL of Americanism."

"Meditate on these ten fundamental principles of your rights as an American," says the editorial.

We have meditated.

"Engrave them on your hearts," it continues.

It hurt a little, but we have done as the Examiner has asked.

We have obediently done these things because we happen to believe in the Bill of Rights as ardently as the Examiner's patriot-editorial writer does.

And then we have read other little items which have been making their quiet appearance of late on the front page of the same newspaper.

These stories have tried to show "what these Japs really are." These Japs are a traitorous bunch of saboteurs with sharp, hidden knives. These Japs are eagerly awaiting the chance to poison the Colorado river and dynamite Parker dam. That is, just as soon as they relax the military guard around the dam---they are going to, aren't they, daddy?

We have read these stories and we have read the Bill of Rights Week editorial. With one hand, the Examiner is writing of the "basic rights of democracy" which the Bill of Rights guarantees. With the other it is writing to eventually deprive a certain class of American citizens of these "basic rights."

Children, isn't the Examiner a versatile newspaper?

Why, children, who ever taught you to cuss like that? H.Y.

Other relocation help by the Detroit Council of Churches includes the organization of a new department called "United Ministry to Resettlers," which is directed by Rev. Shigeo Tanabe, formerly of Tule Lake; and a "Fellowship House," supervised by Mrs. Shigeo Tanabe.

INSTRUCTORS SOUGHT

To assure accredited status of the Post-on Schools, additional instructors with college degrees are needed, especially in the vocational fields. Persons qualified for certification are urgently requested to apply to the principal of the unit school to determine whether or not their services are needed.

PAPAL DELEGATE SAYS JAPANESE OBSERVE LAW

Latest reports on conditions in camps for prisoners of war are carried in Ecclesia, monthly organ of the bureau handling these affairs for the Holy See.

Concerning the visits made by the Most Rev. Paul Marella, Apostolic Delegate to Japan, to Japanese military and civil concentration camps, Ecclesia reports:

The general treatment of the prisoners conforms with international law. Some difficulties arise from the fact that the habits and mentality of the Japanese differ from those of the prisoners. As regards food and clothing, the prisoners receive the same treatment as Japanese soldiers. This is one point where the difference of habits between Americans and the Japanese could cause hardships for the prisoners. There is a monthly distribution of soap, razors and cigarettes. Prisoners generally do not lack money, and they are permitted to make small purchases. Some recreation and sports are permitted, even where obligatory labor and rigorous discipline prevail. Gifts from Pope Pius XII to prisoners and internees are faithfully delivered by camp commanders.

Archbishop Marella visited also four civilian camps where some families, many women, and two religious groups--almost all Americans and Canadians---are interned.

Reporting that, through the courtesy of the American authorities, a Papal representative visited Italian and German prisoners in Algeria, Ecclesia says:
