# AN APPEAL TO THE CAUCASIAN SCHOOL TEACHER

Dear Ladies:

Some thirty years ago, an old lady was sitting in her cozy little breakfast roum 'way down in a California country-town, facing a dumb animal of a young Japanese boy across the table, teaching him how to pronounce some English words such as "Light," "live" and so on. And this lady, long past that stage in life when the feminine sweetness stricly demands her to pay more attention to her looks than her to pay more attention to her looks than anything else, actually looked more like benevolence personified and yet, not in the least, so dignified as some. In a word, she was a true picture of a sweet little grandma type-you know the sort you'd wish to have for your own granny if you just don't happen to have one. Well, she was that sort of a person.

The old lady was then making every possible effort imaginable to show this young man how to pronounce the words. But, the grimaces she
