## THE PISCINE WRAPPER RAPS POSTON AGAIN

Randolph Hearst's Los Angeles Examiner again used the Colorado River Relocation Center as a target for their propaganda articles and pictures last week when they accused the WRA of pampering and coddling the "internees" and of laxativeness in enforcing the regulations.

With a headline, "Armed Jap 'Evacuees' Four ing Into State", and pictures taken by their staking staff photographers who sneak up behind trucks and buildings as if they were a skinny hungry cat trying to catch an unsuspecting rat, the fishwrapper told of hundreds of "internees" who were supplied with pistols and rifles, pouring into California under the eyes of the authorities who are powerless to take action.

The evacuees in the center wish they were supplied with pistols and rifles, even machine guns, so that they could riddle the fishwrapper's staff until they resemble a sieve if they ever made their appearance in the center in search of propaganda material.

The public was told that the "interns" had access to all of the phones in the camp. On the front page the newspaper carried a four-column picture of an evacuee phoning, with a caption stating that they (the 'internee' Japanese) made calls without guards or censorship. The person shown in the picture is a bus-driver who was in Parker to meet the train. He had been called on the phone by a Military Police asking for number of passengers who could enter the camp that night. Another picture captioned "Who's Truck?", showed an evacuee sitting in a truck. This truck is a government truck, but was in Parker to receive the incoming mail for the center.

The evacuees are supposed to be so unguarded in Poston that they are able to have picnics at the Parker Dam or the Imperial Dam, located a few miles north of Yuma. These places are so strictly guarded at the present time that even the Caucasians are forbidden to visit them.

The "internees" are able to drive right up to the Parker Dam and blow up the dam, states the newspaper. This act would be like cutting your own throat as the rising water in the Colorado River would drown the evacuees in Poston like rats.

The stinky piscine wrapper has written many false stories pertaining to the evacuees and the WRA just for propagandism. East of the Rockies, the writer was told, it is a shame to be caught reading a Hearst-owned newspaper due to the low quality of news which is written for the low class readers. S.M.

### PURPOSE OF CLEARANCE EXPLAINED

The purpose of the leave clearance hearings is to obtain evidence concerning the individuals' attitude toward the United States and his obligations of citizenship. Just because the evacuee's clearance is established does not mean that he has to relocate.

The hearings are not intended as trials or cross examinations, but interviews at which each person has an opportunity to state simply and plainly his attitude on basic questions asked and the answers given are recorded and in most cases sent to the Washington Office.

On the basis of the whole investigation, the project hearing board and the project director makes recommendations to the Washington office. The cases are then received by a Washington board which makes recommendations to the project director. Final determinations of leave eligibility are made by the Director.

Persons who are cleared may relocate anywhere in the United States outside of the military areas.
