ANTI-JAPANESE TODAY IS "CLEAN-UP DAY"

LAW HELD

UNCONSTITUTIONAL

The "anti-Japanese" law, which restricted business dealings with persons whose movements are restricted, was unanimously declared unconstitutional by the Arizona Supreme Court on Monday, December 13.

It was held that the law was in violation of both state and federal constitutions, violating the first principle of due process. If strictly enforced, it would apply to many non-Japanese citizens whose movements are restricted in wartime.

The suit for a declaratory judgment was brought by Tsutomu Ikeda, Mesa district farmer. The statute was previously declared unconstitutional by the Maricopa County Superior Court.

Today is "Clean-up Day" in Poston. The residents are urged to collect all debris around and under the barracks, repair torn tar paper, clean fish ponds and pile all trash collected in one spot so that the trash crew can pick it up readily.

The Health Dept. suggests that the 21 blocks used for schools fill their mudholes with gravel so that the children will not step into them.

SPANISH CONSUL TO ARRIVE

CAMP II CLINIC CLOSED NIGHTLY

After December 15, the Camp II Clinic will close at 5 p.m. daily, stated Dr. A. Pressman, director of health and sanitation.

Night emergency calls for doctors or ambulance should be made to the Camp I hospital, Dr. Pressman said. The hospital may be reached by calling 103 and the calls may be put in from any phone convenient.

Francisco de Amat y Torres, Spanish Consul at San Francisco, is scheduled to arrive in Poston on or about December 21.

He will be accompanied by H.W. Benninghoff of the State Department, and Miss Augusta Wager, a former university teacher in Peiping, who returned to the United States on the Gripsholm after internment in Weishien, China.

It is felt that this visit is particularly significant because of the recent announcement by the Japanese government that further exchange of nationals is impossible until it is satisfied as to the treatment of Japanese nationals here.

Senor de Amat y Torres has been in the center twice previously, his last visit being in July of this year.

POSTON ON PACIFIC WAR TIME TIMEPIECES MUST BE RESET

Conforming to a decision of the Yuma County Board of Supervisors to place the business and local government offices throughout Yuma County on a Pacific War Time, it has been decided by project officials that Poston, which is in Yuma County, also will change from mountain War Time to Pacific War Time.

This will require turning back all timepieces, back one hour beginning midnight tonight, Sat., Dec. 18.

New working hours Monday through Friday will be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 5 p.m. The hours on Saturday

for evacuees will be from 8 a.m. to 12 noon.

Schedule for the meals will be: breakfast, 7 a.m.; lunch, 12:10 p.m. and dinner 5:30 p.m.

CAMP II GIRL 1st NISEI WAC

Iris Watanabe, 20, of Santa Cruz, California, and a former resident of 215, Unit II, recently became the first Japanese evacuee member of the Women's Army Corps.

She was in a group of 17 young women who took the WAC oath at a special ceremony in the office of Governor John C. Vivian of Colorado.

MOCHI-GOME ARRIVES

Mochi-gome, the rice to make the New Year's mochi, have arrived, disclosed C.E. Snelson, chief project steward.

Mr. Snelson said an ample supply of the rice was received here and the residents were assured plenty of mochi for the Japanese day.

Many children in Poston are now suffering from the colds that have been prevalent during the past two weeks.

Teachers have been instructed that children who come to school with head colds, running noses or coughs be sent home.

When the children come home they should be put to bed, kept evenly warm, given plenty of water and liquids to drink. Usually a child who is given this care recovers promptly and can return to school in a few days.

If a child has been absent three days or longer, he should come to Ward 7 at 8:30 a.m. to be inspected before returning to school.

If the child is found to be all right, he is given a readmittance slip to present to his teacher.

If a child is feverish or has a sore throat, he should be brought by the clinic for examination by a doctor.
