CAMP TWO OPENS TODAY

Poston's Camp Two officially opens today when approximately 500 more Salinas evacuees arrive here between 3 and 4 p.m. for Intake and Registration. With a housing capacity of 5000, the new center, three miles south of Camp One, is expected to be entirely filled by the middle of July, according to J.D. Crawford. A special emergency Intake and Housing staff of 12 women and 9 men--all from Camp One--will live at Camp Two for the next four days. Four special policemen have been assigned to Camp Two. The Daily Press Bulletin, through Norris James, Press Officer, announces that a Camp Two office will be established tomorrow, and that a special training staff of newspaper men and women will be immediately set up. Starting on Tuesday, the second section of the Daily Press Bulletin will be printed at Camp Two and incorporated with Section One, for general distribution in both camps.

Guayule

Future Rubber Growing Here

"Almost all of the 60,000 guayule plants have been planted," said Frank Kuwahara, in charge of the guayule project. We expect to get a research laboratory set up very shortly to experiment with rubber."

"Plants now in the lath house will be transplanted into the fields this fall. There will be transplanted into the fields this fall. There will be test plots throughout the community to determine the most suitable soils and growing conditions. After the plants mature, all results will be turned over to the government," Mr. Kuwahara continued. Thirty men are working on the project.

A nursery is to be built soon. The expectation is to have lath houses up shortly and made ready for vegetable plants for the farm.
