## TWO NISEI MADE CAPTAIN

Two Americans of Japanese descent were among the men promoted by Lt. Gen. Mark W. Clark for outstanding battle field leadership, when the latter made a dawn to dusk tour of the Fifth Army front in Italy and distributed more than 100 decorations, promotions and battlefield appointments among his American, British and French troops, the Los Angeles Times reported on

Dec. 27. The men, A. Fukuda of Honolulu and H. Kawano of Pearl City, Oahu, were both made captains. The Fifth Army commander, who waded through thick mud and drove a jeep over a 50-square mile area to reach the most advanced sections commended the 300th Infantry Battalion on doing a fine job and said that the U.S. Army was proud of the unit.

## TO ALL EVACUEE EMPLOYEES

During the past 18 months it has been my pleasure to serve as Chief Administrative Officer in charge of the Administrative Management Division of this Project and as the time approaches for me to leave Poston, I am reminded very forcibly of the splendid work performed by the evacuees in the many and varied positions which have been established in this Division.

You as residents of Poston have been called upon to serve this Project and the Government by filling all types of positions, both of a major and minor character. Many of the positions, which you filled would ordinarily have been established under regular Civil Service procedure. I have said many times that while in some instances you did not receive a salary commensurate with the duties and responsibilities involved, you have accumulated very valuable experience which will be of benefit to you in seeking employment when you leave Poston. I think your job has been doubly difficult in view of the fact that the central theme of the WRA program has been, and will undoubtedly continue to be, relocation. I think you have accomplished remarkable results in view of the fact that your plans have been, and are, to relocate sooner or later.

In discussing evacuation with many of the residents I have invariably expressed the thought that perhaps the evacuation and subsequent relocation programs will actually result in benefiting all persons of Japanese ancestry, even though this experience has been very difficult. As for myself, there is no question in my mind but that my association with the residents of Poston during the past 18 months has been a very profitable experience. It has been one which I have enjoyed to the utmost. I have thrilled at the sight of new recruits occupying important clerical and accounting positions for the first time and who have displayed an interest and enthusiasm for their work which is unsurpassed anywhere. Many of you have worked as industriously and efficiently and perhaps even more so than if you were occupying similar positions elsewhere. Without this indomitable spirit displayed by the evacuee employees in their respective positions, it would not have been possible to successfully establish and operate the Administrative Management.

FROM TEMPLE

Reverend Kubose, the custodian of the Higa-shi Hongwanji Temple, 118 North Mott Street, Los Angeles, has approved the removal of the evacuee property stored in the temple, the evacuee property office announced.

It is reported that there are some 260 families representing 1500 people having property stored in this temple. All persons who are desirous of having the W.R.A. transfer their property from the temple to the Government Warehouse are requested to appear in the Evacuee Property Office, Room 48, Administration Building, Unit I, to execute the proper forms for this property.

Heretofore, it has been impossible for the W.R.A. to obtain the evacuee property from this temple as Reverend Kubose was adamant in his refusal to permit the temple to be opened. This information was received by this project by memorandum from Harvey Burnett, Evacuee Property Officer at Heart Mountain Relocation Center, Wyoming.
