GAPC ISSUES REGULATIONS FOR CLAIM

Regulations have been recently issued by the Office of Alien Property Custodian setting forth the procedure for the assertion of a claim to release from or against the Alien Property Custodian because of any vesting, supervisory, or other order of said custodian, stated Project Attorney T. H. Haas. Provision is made for the filing of notice of claim within one year after the order to which they relate.

POSTON CENSUS 13,838 DEC. 31

Poston ended 1943 with a population of approximately 13,838 or 7305 persons were recorded in Unit I on December 31; 2905 in II on December 29, and 3538 in III on December 27, according to figures compiled by the housing division.

This figure indicates that there has been an increase of over 200 residents since November 29, when 13,605 were listed.

INCOME TAX FILING TIME AGAIN

POLIO VICTIMS RECOVER BY KENNY TREATMENT

Of the 13 cases of infantile paralysis which were hospitalized in the center this last year, only two are still noticeably affected, and eleven have completely recovered with little or no after-trace of the disease, Miss Elma Rood of the Public Health Department reports.

This miraculous percentage of recovery was made possible by the quick and expert application of the Sister Kenny treatment, which was introduced here by Miss Beatrice Vlahos of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. The Foundation sent Miss Vlahos here, completely financing here ten-weeks stay early in 1943, immediately after it learned of the epidemic in Boston.

However, in order that future victims of poliomyelitis and past victims who have been left crippled may be aided, a committee on infantile paralysis has recently been established in the center. It will endeavor to raise funds and educate the community in various aspects of the disease.

The principle fund-raising means will be the President's Birthday Ball, which to be held in conjunction with the national annual campaign whose proceeds go to the Foundation and its widespread agencies. Sponsoring the Ball for the second year will be the YBA, which is making plans to have a separate Ball in each unit simultaneously.

A second means of soliciting contributions will probably be the selling of "polio" buttons.
