## AMPHITHEATRE FINISHED IN 3

Construction of the Unit III amphitheater started a month ago and which seemed to have been forgotten, was again brought to life with block carpenters and construction workers under the supervision of F. Nakagawa, working endlessly and steadily on the construction and Unit III's electricians' wiring the stage despite the heavy fire, was completed in time for the New Years all unit "drama" performance staged here last Saturday and Sunday evening.

The amphitheater located between the firebreaks of Rotu I and III have a 40'x 40' stage with 3 feet wide halls on both sides and built on concrete foundations.

Just behind the stage is the 20'x40' dressing room which is walled with plaster board. A small upstairs portion is built where actors will be situated.

"Many" portions of this theater are temporary, including the "hona-nichi" as work on this project was rushed.

## NIMURA HEADS PARALYSIS DRIVE
