CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATION RESULTS ISSUED

Results received here revealed that out of the 40 girls who took Civil Service examinations here last month, 10 passed the jr. stenographic, 20, the jr. typist-clerical and 10, the clerical.

The highest average grade for the examination was received by Mary T. Kinoshita, 64 D, and Akiko T. Kobayashi, 308 4 B, who scored 92.5. Atsuko Aoki, who had previously passed the typist-clerical exam, made 96 on the stenography test. Other grades are available at the unit relocation offices.

Another examination will be given as soon as enough interest is evinced by qualified applicants according to Ed Nossoff, assistant relocation officer. Those who have not passed their clerical or stenographic tests may re-take them, he added.

CAMP II HAS FIRE SCARE

BAZAAR FIGURES RELEASE FOR II

The much-awaited general accounting of the Christmas Bazaar has been released by T.S. Nishi, chief auditor. This accounting was approved by S. Shirazawa, chairman of the committee; M. Yoshida, head treas. K. J. Takashima and K. Karasawa, treas.

The total gross sales and donations received were \$7,534.10. Total merchandise and cost of goods sold were \$4581.24, which leaves the gross profit on sales as \$2,952.86. Deducting the general expense of \$359.06 involved in this Bazaar, the net profit sales was \$2593.80.

Distribution of Bazaar profits were made as follows: Christmas gifts for children and bachelors \$970.19; donation to Boy Scouts \$50; baseball \$25; PTA \$35; Poston III school annual \$200; distribution to 17 block manager's offices \$50 each to 16 blocks, and \$10 to Blk. 310; Total \$310.

Total distribution is \$2,740.19. The balance of \$453.61 has been distributed among the needy families and bachelors.

TYPIST JOBS OPEN IN D.C.

Positions as typists, stenographers and telephone operators with the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration in Washington, D.C. are open to qualified residents, according to a communication from Robert Dolins, Washington relocation supervisor.

Ten typists and stenographers, the first at \$1440 plus overtime and the latter at \$1620 plus overtime, will be accepted, while three telephone operators (CAF-3) are needed for immediate work.

212 EMPLOYED IN UNIT II

Project employment statistics disclosed by Manabu Fukuda, Poston II Labor Commissioner, revealed that as of January 10, 1944 from the population of 3,895 evacuees in Unit II, 1,212 are presently employed as full time workers by the WRA receiving \$16 or \$19 a month respectively.

In addition, the project has 101 part-timers employed, 42 other evacuees working, who are not paid by WRA. The grand total of these workers amount to approximately 50% of the total population, which is an commendable record in comparison with any small town or city in the United States.
