## JAPAN SENDS SUPPLIES TO CENTER THROUGH RED CROSS

A portion of the 350 ton supply of goods sent to the Japanese in relocation centers and internment camps by the Japanese government is expected to arrive here soon according to a letter received by the local Red Cross Chapter from the Washington office.

## PHARMACISTS NEEDED BY CIVIL SERVICE

Several Civil Service openings for registered pharmacists are reported by WRA Director Dillon Meyer, as being available for qualified evacuees.

Because many of those qualified have already left relocation centers to accept non-pharmaceutical positions, it is asked that they be notified in order that they may engage in the work they have been trained for, as well as help lessen the nation's acute pharmacy shortage.

Those well qualified will generally receive about \$2000 while less qualified pharmacists may be placed on \$1800 and \$1680 jobs.

It is generally required that the applicant have four years' experience as a registered pharmacist or a BS degree in pharmacy from an accredited college, or a combination of the two totaling four years.

The unit relocation advisors will assist interested residents in making the proper application.

## PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT SECTION ESTABLISHED IN CENTER

Because the remodeling of offices for the newly created personnel management section is almost completed, the section is now in a position to establish an active employment program.

In order to fill its proposed complement of 35 staff workers for the three units persons who have employment or personnel experience or persons who are interested in receiving training in this type of work are being sought.

The new project employment program will place particular emphasis on filling all vacancies which now exist in Camp I, II and III and will include cooperative participation in training with the vocational and commercial schools and the hospital as well as apprenticeship training in manual skills utilized by the operations division.

In order to remedy the manpower shortage, the new section is particularly anxious to recruit workers from additional sources, such as (1) mothers and students who can work part time; (2) residents who feel unqualified, whom the section will train on the job with an eye to providing practical experience toward relocation; and (3) persons who are idle because they plan to relocate in the near future. With the last group it is suggested that in the time between their application for relocation and their actual departure, office routine and other skills could be improved upon.

Heading the personnel management section is Philip J. Cassally, personnel officer, who will be assisted by Lloyd M. Johnson, formerly regional personnel officer with the Office of Emergency Management in Denver.

The supply consisting of shoyu, miso and medicine were brought to United States on the return trip of the exchange ship S S Gripsholm and was staged.

Santa Fe Detention Station has already received their share of the goods, but the arrival of goods consisting of 680 kegs of shoyu, 27 of miso and four cases of medicine to Poston were not known. It was not known until Jan. 19 that the relocation centers would be supplied the goods.

## ADDITIONAL FAMILIES LEAVE FOR TEXAS

Four more families totaling 17 persons were added to the group who left Wednesday morning, January 19, to make their home at the Crystal City (Tex.) internment center, raising the number of departing residents to 48.

The additional names, as reported by the family welfare section, include: Mrs. Toyoko Ase 39-4-D and four children; Mrs. Ava Kasai 31-6-2-A and two children; Mr. and Mrs. Guntchi Fukushima 30-7-12-B and five children; and Mrs. Kum Uchida 60-2-C and child.

## OILERS OPEN LEAGUE WITH 39-32 VICTORY

Led by Mac Okuma's blistering last quarter scoring and Danny Fukushima's consistent buckets in the first three quarters, the Bakersfield Oilers opened the "A.I." League with a 39-32 victory over the Delano Dukes.

It was a much closer game than the seven point margin indicates. In fact the Dukes held a 33-32 margin with less than three minutes to go only to wilt before Okuma's scoring splurge.

The Oilers as usual got off to a fast start on Mac Okuma's field goal and Fukushima's gift shot only to have the Dukes come back matching bucket for bucket to end the first quarter in a 9-9 tie.

In the second quarter each team kept up the pace with the Oilers holding a slight 15-14 lead at half.

The third quarter found the Dukes outplaying their highly touted foes as the Ikemiyama brothers, Joe and George together with M.I. Iami sank thirteen points between them to the Oilers eight to hold a 27-23 lead.

The announcement by the War Department that Nisei are to be inducted into the Army through the Selective Service system marks another significant step forward for American citizens of Japanese descent. It means that Japanese American soldiers now in the Army have performed their duties with high skill and courage and that the valuable services rendered by such soldiers have been recognized.

The obligation to bear arms in defense of the nation is one of the essential elements of American citizenship. As increasing numbers of Nisei are call-

## WAR DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCEMENT WELCOMING NEWS, BURGE

The announcement yesterday by the War Department of plans for induction of Nisei into the Army through the Selective Service system is welcome news to the residents of Poston. Loss of the right to serve their country in the armed forces on the same basis as any other citizens has been felt most keenly by the Nisei, most of whom have looked forward to the day when they would be permitted to assume the full responsibilities of American citizenship.

Five hundred and sixty sons of Poston are already in uniform, many of them volunteering for special services for our govern-

## WAR DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES DRAFTING OF NISEI

Plans have been completed for the reinstatement of General Selective Service procedures for American citizens of Japanese descent. The War Department announced yesterday.

Under the War Department plans Japanese Americans considered acceptable for military service will be reclassified by their Selective Service Board on the same basis as other citizens and called for induction if physically qualified and not deferred.

Details of the Selective Service plan as it applies

Las: February the 42nd Combat Team composed of Japanese American volunteers was formed. In a letter to the Secretary of War commenting on the formation of this Unit the President said: "No loyal citizen of the United States should be denied the right to exercise the responsibilities of his citizenship regardless of his ancestry. The principle on which this country was founded and by which it has always been governed is that Americanism is a matter of the mind and heart; Americanism is not and never was a matter of race or ancestry."

The excellent showing which the Combat Team has made in training and the outstanding record achieved by the 100th Battalion (A former Hawaiian National Guard Unit) now fighting in Italy were major factors in the present plan.
