TAX AIDE DUE HERE SOON

To assist taxpayers in preparing their state income tax returns for 1943, Dan Millican of the State Income Tax Division will

arrive in the center for a release from the legal division.

Millican will be located in the office of Ted Haas, project attorney and his services will be available to all persons who are required to file income tax returns.

Reports are required on or before March 15 of the following: (1) every corporation doing business within the State whether taxable or not; (2) every person other than a corporation who received during the year (a) a gross income of \$5000 or over or (b) a net income of \$1000 or over if single and (c) a net income of \$2000 or over if married; (3) and every partnership.

Residents are requested to have their data assembled to enable Mr. Millican to prepare the returns with as little preliminary work as possible as time will not permit any extensive work on any one return.

POSTON LEADS IN RELOCATION

Poston stands the highest among all relocation centers in the number of persons relocated, with 3161 persons listed as having gone out as of January 1, 1944. Minidoka comes second with 2854 departures.

Of the 3163 Poston leaves, 2707 were indefinite, 412 seasonal and 44 short-term. 2275 from Minidoka were indefinite leaves.

But the population of the Colorado River War Relocation Center remains the highest at 13732, and although only 1416 persons have left Rowher (Ark.) that center has the smallest population, 6561, and therefore the least number of residents who have yet to relocate.

WOMAN DOCTOR

JOINS HOSPITAL

Dr. Agnes V. Barlett, graduate of Yale Medical School, has the distinction of having made the first Boston (Mass.) baby of 1944. This occurred at the Massachusetts Memorial Hospital where Dr. Barlett has been a resident and clinical physician in obstetrics. That is the hospital whose head, Dr. Chester S. Keefer, has all the say so about penicillin.

Although Dr. Barlett is a Norwich, Vermont, she was originally born in Japan, her parents were missionaries where she lived for eight years.

Dr. Barlett is an only daughter but has three brothers who are all in the Navy.

Incidentally, this same Dr. Barlett, blonde handsome and in person, is the latest addition to the Poston General Hospital staff. She arrived here last Wednesday evening from Boston where it was 40 degrees below zero when she left.

SCHOOL CODE APPROVED BY COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Following is the Boston School Code which has been approved and adopted by the Boston Community Council:

The Community Council of the Community of Boston do ordain the following Boston School Code:

I Compulsory Attendance Every person in Boston having control of any child between the age of six and eighteen years shall send such child to the Boston Schools for the full time that such schools are in session within the Unit in which such child resides provided that such person shall be excused from such duty by the Director of Education or such party or parties whom he may designate and the Youth Counseling Board, if such an organization is in existence and if not the Judicial Commission of the particular unit in which the child resides. Such excuses may be granted if one or more of the following exist:

(a) That such child is in such physical or mental condition as to render such attendance inexpedient or impracticable.

(b) And if presented any reasons for such non-attendance satisfactory to such party parties and or boards as herein authorized to pass on such excuses.

(c) Or is over 16 years of age and it is adjudged by the party parties and/or boards herein authorized to pass on excuses that such child will benefit more from full time employment at an approved lawful wage earning occupation than from continued attendance at school.

(d) Or has completed the requirements for graduation from the senior high school.

II Employment of Minors No child under the age of eighteen years shall be employed by any person during the hours that the schools are in session unless such child shall present a work permit from the school principal or his authorized

FORMER BOSTONIAN MAKING GOOD IN DES MOINES

Harrie Wakayanagi was a respected businessman in Los Angeles when the name Pearl Harbor suddenly acquired a new association. The dispersal that followed found the jewelry shop he had owned for two years one of those poignant things that memories are made of.

Well Boston was all right. With a roof over his head, food under his belt, and \$19 a month in his pocket for being block manager it was all right. But Harrie wanted something better for his wife, his child and himself. So on July 8 last year, they went out from Boston to try to resume the business of normal living.

1944 finds the Wakayanagis established in a "nice large bungalow" in Des Moines, Iowa. Fortunately they didn't go on a desperate selling spree when evacuation came around and their household furnishings, "from refrigerator on down to books," are their own, which they had sent them from California. They are "well settled, contented and living comfortably," and do not intend to return to California. A watch repairman with the Plumb Jewelry Store in Des Moines ("the oldest store in the state, founded in 1865") Harrie is the only nisei employee. Receiving top salary, too.

Up to here this has been a not uncommon story of relocation for I have neglected to tell you that several years ago Harrie was left crippled by infantile paralysis. From his hips down he is forced to wear braces of steel and leather. When he first thought of going east he was troubled because the braces had become unreliable. The steel rattled somewhat when he walked, and the leather was quite worn. But a new pair would be terribly expensive.

It so happened that in January last year there was an infantile paralysis campaign in the center. The community had responded nicely to the appeal, making available a fund here for aiding persons disabled in some way because of polio. What better use for it than to get Harrie Wakayanagi a complete set of new braces?

And so it was with confidence in his face the day that he and his family began their journey to a brand new better way of life it was partly due to the dime you contributed last January. Give again this year and then how about you relocating too?

THE RELOCATOR

agency stating the hours of the school day during which employment is approved, or unless such child shall present a certificate from the Director of Education stating that he has been excused from attendance from school for one of the reasons set forth in Section "I" above, which certificate may be revoked at any time. A record of the nature of such employment and the employer's evaluation of the work of such a child shall be incorporated in the child's permanent school record.

III Truant Officers The Director of Education may appoint an attendance officer or officers who shall see that the regulations regarding the employ-

ment of minors and their attendance at school are obeyed. He may without a warrant bring children who are absent from school without a proper legal excuse before the authority competent to hear and dispose of such cases and may enter all places where Children may be employed to investigate and enforce this regulation.

IV Liability of Parents Any pupil who cuts, defaces or otherwise injures any school property with criminal intent or without due care is liable to suspension or expulsion and upon complaint of the Education Administrative Council the parents or guardians of such pupils shall be liable for such damages.

The Penguins failed to live up to their advance notices as they only made 7 field goals during the entire game with the other 13 points coming on charity throws.

From the opening whistle when Fukushima made good a free throw followed by M. Okuma's field goal the Oilers were threatened only once as Nakazaki sank a 30 footer which he followed up with a set up to give the Penguins a temporary 7-6 lead midway in the first quarter.
