

TEMPLE-STORED GOODS MOVED

All of the property stored at the Nishi Hongwanji Temple, 119 N. Central Avenue in Los Angeles have been moved to government warehouses, the Evacuee Property Office report ed.

All persons who had property stored at the temple are requested to appear at one of the three evacuee property offices in each unit to fill out forms requesting storage or transporting of their goods, immediately.

LOCAL POPULATION

Figures available for January 29, 1944, from the housing division reveal that the center population on that date was 13,811.

This includes 7322 in Unit I, 2865 in Unit II, 3502 in Unit III, and 122 in the General Hospital.

NOTIFY PLANNING DIVISION IF INFO. TO BOARD UNCERTAIN

All Nisei of military age who are not certain that they listed, complete information concerning Local Selective Service Boards at the time of registration early in 1943 are urged to send name, number and address of their boards to the Relocation Planning Division, Washington, D.C., according to Dillon Myr, National Director.

While induction will be a gradual process, it is essential that

the records of each individual be brought up to date at once. Nisei men of military age are reminded also of the important of keeping Selective Service Boards notified of all changes of addresses.

Responsibility for such notification rests with the individual. Men who cannot be located to appear for pre-induction physical examination when his order number appears will be reported as delinquent and is liable to severe penalties provided under the Selective Training and Service Act.

RELEASE OF CONTRABANDS DELAYED

"There will be a delay in the release of the contrabands from the custody of the U. S. Marshal due to shortage of manpower," states R. W. Schmitt, Evacuee Property Officer of this Center, upon his return from Evacuee Property Conference recently held at San Francisco, California.

The delay is caused due to the fact that the personal property of the evacuees relocated to new area must be shipped to them as soon as possible. It is the decision of the Transportation Division that the household goods and personal property of the relocated people have the priority over the transportation of the contraband articles.

The Evacuee Property Office regrets that there is this delay in obtaining the contrabands, but have been promised that as soon

as a crew of men could be released from the urgent work, the impounded articles will be obtained and shipped to the evacuees.

2nd ACCIDENT PREVENTION WEEK RATE SET

The week of February 7-12 has been set as the 2nd Annual Poston Red Cross Accident Prevention week, according to the Poston Red Cross chapter.

Specific plans for the reduction of existent accidents hazards were formulated at the Accident Prevention Committee meeting held January 13, attended by representatives of administrative and civic departments throughout the center.

ROCHDALE PRINCIPLES

When in 1844 the 28 people of Rochdale organized the first co-op store, they drew up a set of principles. Since that time co-ops all over the world have adopted these principles as their guide. Co-ops which follow them are strong and progressive. The members of our Poston Co-op should memorize these principles for they constitute the basis required for sound voting judgment on any question they may discuss in membership meetings.

I--Open Membership. The Poston Co-op allows anyone to become a member over the minimum age of 16 as specified in the by-laws. In this way continuous expansion is assured and no profiteering can be carried on by a small group of cooperators at the expense of non-members.

II--One member--one vote. No matter how many shares a member holds in the cooperative, he gets only one vote. In this way the poorest member of the Co-op has as much control of the business as anyone else. Through this principle, democratic control is maintained.

CO-OP OPENS NEW DEPARTMENT

Through the medium of a weekly issue of the Co-op News published in the Poston Chronicle, the department will keep before the membership the policies, principles, and facts about their cooperative enterprises. With the information thus provided, the entire membership can begin to exert real democratic interest in the affairs of the co-op through the block meetings held under the chairmanship of their elected delegates.

The Educational Dept. invites the criticism of the membership at any and all times on the methods it employs in carrying the program to the people. In order for the enterprise to be a cooperative in the true sense of the word, it is essential that every member understand and actively participate in its affairs.

In addition to the publication of a weekly news sheet, a program of study, action groups, lectures, moving pictures, monthly social gatherings, and full membership meetings will be promoted in all 3 units. Also a centennial celebration will be planned in conjunction with all other co-ops in the U.S., and in fact the world over, to mark the first 100 years of cooperative business. (To be cont'd)

INSURANCE SERVICE

Personal property insurance is available to the residents of Poston under a master policy from the Reliance Insurance Co. of Phil. Applications are being accepted in the usual manner in the following places: Unit 1, main office of Comm. Enter.; Unit 2, Comm. Enter. Superv'r office; Unit 3, Comm. Enter. Superv'r office.

Premium rate is \$1.25 per \$100 coverage and a minimum coverage of \$200 is required of each applicant. The total amount of personal property insurance carried under this plan as of Jan 10 1944, is as follows: Unit 1--\$4,200; Unit 2--\$5400; Unit 3--\$21,200. Three claims have been filed against the company to date in the amount of \$1550.00

A. A complete audit of the accounts was conducted by representatives of the Northwestern Auditing and Service Assoc. June 30, 1943. The Board of Directors has arranged for the same assoc. to conduct the next audit in March of this year.
