

**DETAIL ON RELOCATION TEAM SCHEDULE  
MAMIE YOSHIDA'S PACKED FOR SIX-DAY STAY**

**DEATH TOLD**

Miss Mamie Yoshida passed away in Washington last week due to agranulocytosis, depletion of white blood cells according to a teletype message from WRA office in Washington.

Miss Yoshida took sick leave on Feb. 17 after she had been having treatments for an impacted wisdom tooth, the wire stated. Her dentist recognized that she needed other medical attention and referred her to a very reputable dental surgeon Dr. Howard Newton. Dr. Newton realized she was very ill and called Dr. S. R. Karpeles of the medical center who sent her to the hospital.

At the hospital her blood was analyzed and the test revealed that practically all of her white corpuscles were destroyed her count being 300 while the normal count is from 5000 to 8000. This sickness is very rare and is said to be fatal in a short time. Immediately a plea for penicillin was made by the doctor and four blood transfusions were given but she weakened fast passing away at 1:20 Wednesday afternoon.

**DISLOYALTY BILL PASSED**

An Administration-approved bill by which native born citizens of this country formally could renounce their citizenship in time of war, subject to approval of the Attorney General was passed by the House in Washington last Wednesday, according to an A.P. dispatch from Washington.

Although the measure does not specifically name the Japanese American citizens now interned in this country, it was aimed at them, the House immigration committee said.

Rep. Gearheart of California, attempted to defeat the bill by an emasculating amendment, arguing that the bill would give Attorney General too much power

## MORE SELECTIVE SERVICE QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

## RELOCATION TEAM

(Continued From Last Week)

Q. What is the appeal procedure?

A. An individual should appeal through his own Local Board where he registered, within ten days from the time he received his classification. The letter of appeal should state reasons for the appeal, and may include any statements or affidavits supporting the appeal. That Board will then transfer his appeal to the Appeal Board for the area in which he is employed. This Board will then act on it.

Q. Is the Local Board, the Board of initial registration?

A. Yes, that will always be the individual's home or Local Board.

Q. What allowances are given to an inducted individual's family?

A. \$50 to the wife, \$30 for the first child, and \$20 for each additional child.

Q. Does the Selective Service affect those who are applying for expatriation?

A. No, it does not make any difference if they are cleared through Washington.

Q. Is there a possibility of starting a Board here in Poston?

A. There would be no possibility of starting a Board here because it will not be advantageous and there will not be a great need for it in the future.

Q. What is the proper procedure for handling the medical examinations on the Project?

A. The names of those who have been cleared by the Military Intelligence Department and their Local Draft Boards will be sent to Mr Crawford, who will send to Sgt Porter the addresses of all those not on the Project. Those who are on the Project will be notified that they are to report for physical examinations to the medical officer. They will be allowed two or three days in which to let Mr Crawford know whether they have appealed their IA classifications or expect to leave the Project. If they do not notify Mr Crawford within two or three days, it will be necessary for them to appear for their X-ray and blood analysis and possibly other examinations. After request of the Project Director, the Medical Director will forward to Phoenix the X-rays and blood samples, so that the results of these tests will be available when the medical team arrives on March 19.

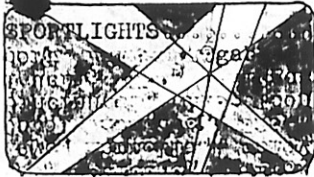
