Dr. Arthur L. Harris, superintendent of Poston schools, returned to the project last week from Washington, D.C. where he had been assigned to special duty with the leave clearance Review Board.

RELOCATION AID FOR FARMERS SEEN

Because evacuee farmers have shown that they prefer to relocate to areas where there are opportunities to rent or purchase land for vegetable production, both the Washington and field staffs of the relocation division are ex-

ploring such farming possibilities, according to Dillon S. Myer, WRA director.

Some progress has been made, but in some cases center residents who have rented or purchased land before becoming acquainted with the community have had to withdraw. It is therefore suggested that those who wish to rent or purchase land do so after first living and working in the area for awhile in order to gauge community attitudes. This precaution, it is hoped, will prevent financial losses as well as relocation discouragements.

The immediate purchase of land is being discouraged by the WRA, unless the relocation officer of the specified area reports satisfactory community acceptance, Director Myer continues. Even when the prospect seems very promising, consultation with the area relocation officer is strongly recommended.

Residents are asked to carefully consider the employment invitations for farm labor with the above points in mind. The unit relocation offices will be glad to assist any persons who are considering farm relocation.

FAMILY WELFARE SECTION STAFF INCREASED

Two additional staff members have recently been assigned to the Family Welfare Section, to meet the growing need for "future-planning" with Poston families, Project Director Duncan Mills said today. Family planning discussions have been conducted as part of the regular Welfare procedure in connection with transfers, repatriation, and family problems. The discussion procedure will be made available to more families by the addition of the new staff members, Mr. Mills explained.

"The discussion of future plans with Poston families has two purposes", the Project Director explained. "The first is to give information to Poston families that will be helpful in solving the problems with which they are faced. The second is to get information about the kinds of problem they face, so that WRA can use its resources more effectively in helping solve them."

The family planning discussion program is entirely voluntary, and any resident of Poston will be welcome to ask for future-planning conferences if they wish them. Early preference will be given

to families in which recent events, such as the departure or return of key members, have made it necessary to reconsider family plans.

New workers are also being made available to the Relocation Division, so that its relocation conferences can include discussion of the family's plan for the future, Mr. Mills further said.

"like the Community Council in its recent survey of relocation prospects, the WRA is trying to learn where the majority of our people expect to be in the next months. At the same time, we are trying to help each family find its own destination whether (Cont. on page 2)

As repair parts are difficult to obtain, the full cooperation of the residents are asked.

MISS OGATA FIRST FOSTONIAN TO RETURN TO HAWAII

Believed to be one of the first person to be permitted to return to Hawaii from a relocation center, Misue Ogata of 19-11-A left Foston last Thursday night for San Francisco, from where she will embark for Honolulu. From her home in Honolulu, she plans to go to the island of Kauai where a teaching position has been assured her.

Her return without escort was approved by Army and Navy authorities, and all travel expenses are being assumed by the government.

Miss Ogata came to the project in Sept., 1942, and has been a core teacher at Foston I High School. She evacuated from Greeley, Colorado, where she was doing post-graduate work at Colorado State Teacher's College.

A graduate of McKinley High School and the University of Hawaii, where she majored in education, she came to the mainland in Feb. 1941 to continue her studies and received her M.A. degree from Colorado State Teacher's College.

"Words fail me in expressing how much I appreciate the kindness and generosity of my Foston friends," Miss Ogata said in parting. "I hate to leave you, but as this is my one

and only chance for the duration of the war, to return to Hawaii, I must say "Aloha' and Mahalo'. Thanks for everything."
