Who among us enjoys the dust laden air which identifies Poston from afar? Yet a few of us contribute carelessly to the discomfort of all. The grinding wheels of autos and treads of tractors produce 99% of the dust. Some is inevitable--but much is the result of unnecessary speed. Driving at 10 to 15 miles an hour inside the Poston city limits would cut out a large percent of the dust. Most of us are not on sufficiently important business to make the loss of 5 or 10 miles per hour of great importance to our job. But by slowing down we'll make Poston more liveable for all.

Watch your speedometer--hold it down to 15 miles or less inside the city limits. This means all kinds of motor driven vehicles--so it means you if you drive one.

100 CANDIDATES LISTED FOR ELECTION

Over a hundred candidates are listed in thirty-one blocks, and more are being added by circulating petitions. Enthusiastic are the Poston citizens in the coming election of the Temporary Community Council, a representative body of the residents of Poston to aid in the establishment of the Community self-government system, according to Theodore H. Haas, Project Attorney.

At present, the merits of the nominees, who are all American Citizens, are being discussed throughout Camp I in order that the one most capable from each block will be elected on July 21. Subsequent elections will be held in Camp 2 and in the remainder of Camp I as soon as the residents are settled.

The Council will be authorized to make recommendations on matters relating to health, welfare, education, law and order and other matters and problems to be dealt with, within the community.

450 SALINAS EVACUEES MOVED TO CAMP 2

Approximately 450 evacuees from the Salinas Assembly Center, who were residing in Camp 1 since their arrival here, started moving to Camp 2, Wednesday, July 8, to be united with their relatives and friends according to a reliable source.

The movement started Wednesday morning and continued to Thursday, with the aid of twenty multi-wheeler trucks carrying the persons and baggages to their permanent quarters, for the duration. It is estimated that very few of the Salinas evacuees now residing in Camp 2 will be brought to Camp 1.

With the completion of the movement, it is expected that the Salinas group will be divided equally among the two camps.

At the present, it is not known who will occupy the vacant apartments due to the movement of the evacuees, although these vacancies will eventually be occupied in the near future.
