Shoichi James Okamoto, 30, former resident of Garden Grove and Heart Mountain center, was shot by a sentry at Tule Lake center Wednesday afternoon, May 24, according to a wire received by Pro-Ject Director Duncan mills from National Director Dillon S. Myer, Mr. Okamoto died in the base hospital at 12:10 a.m. Thursday.

"Although the skies are gray, the weather gloomy, wet, and hot, I feel today as I used to feel during bright spring mornings back home. For this morning (April 30th) I was deluged with 20 some-odd letters. There is nothing like letters to cure a good case of the blues.

"Yes, battle conditions and atmosphere are now a reality. As I sit in our bashs-office typing this out, can hear the whine of the projectiles 85 they pass overhead. 
