## POSTON AND PARKER SCOUTS LOADS 30 TONS OF WASTEPAPER

### Half of Polio Campaign Proceeds to be Retained

Word has been received that Basil C. Connor, former law partner of President Roosevelt and President of the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation, has declared that Poston will be able to retain 50%

of the proceeds of the last campaign, as outside cities are doing.

A controversy has been waged since the last President's Ball, on whether 50% should be retained here for work in infantile paralysis and 50% sent to the National Foundation, or whether 100% should be sent to the National Foundation. Miss Elma Rood, head of Public Health Nursing, Dr. A. Presman, the Poston Infantile Paralysis Committee, and Dr. John Powell, have worked for the retention of 50% for project use.

The Poston funds will be in charge of the Project Director who will disburse them on advice of the Infantile Paralysis Committee and the medical staff. A few grants have already been made to some Poston residents.

### PROPERTY MAN TO ARRIVE

Earl Browne, Field Representative of the San Francisco Evacuee Property Office, representing the Coast Area of Northern California, is scheduled to be here Tues., June 6, staying until June 8, according to the Evacuee Property Office. He will be glad to see any evacuee with property problems in the Salinas, Watsonville, San Francisco, and San Jose areas.

Mr. Browne will be at the Evacuee Property Office Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

### Center Gives 20 Tons, Parker 10

Marking a milestone in friendly relationships between Poston and Parker, Boy Scouts from both communities combined their efforts to assist in the national wastepaper campaign on Saturday and Sunday, May 27 and 28 at Parker. The wastepaper collected from Poston and Parker was combined to make approximately the 60,000 pounds, a minimum carload weight.

Poston I Boy Scouts led by Arthur Kaniye, Neighborhood Commissioner of Unit I, and the Parker Scout Troop led by Wesley Bush, Scoutmaster, did all of the work of loading and unloading. Lunches for the Unit I Troops were prepared by the Unit I Girl Scouts, led by Sue Sakamoto.

On Saturday and Sunday afternoons, the Parker Troop escorted the Poston Scouts to the store, malt-shop, and other places in Parker. Some of the Poston Boy Scouts enjoyed their first Coca Colas in two years. Late Sunday afternoon, after loading, the

### 121 VISITS CENTER IN MAY

During the month of May, 3171 meals were served to 121 persons who visited the project, according to James D. Crawford, relocation program officer. They paid \$634.20 for meals during their stay on the project.

### RIVER WATER UNFIT FOR DRINKING

A test of the Colorado River water revealed that the river water is unsafe for human consumption, according to C.A. Dennis, project sanitarian.

Mr. Dennis stated that the river serves as sewers directly or indirectly, carrying away varying proportions of waste produced by inhabitant from dams along the river. Laboratory tests revealed the presence of B-Coli, an organism not harmful itself, but found in intestinal tracts of man and animals.

Many people believe that running water purifies itself every 100 feet, but this is untrue, stated Mr. Dennis. All stream water should be purified by boiling 15 minutes before they are usable, otherwise, a person may contract typhoid, paratyphoid fevers, dysentery or diarrhea, which are most likely to be conveyed by the water in the U. S.

Fishermen and picnickers are urged to carry sufficient water on their trips for drinking purpose.

## UNIT I FIRE SYSTEM READY

Tested and ready for service is the new fire reporting telephone service, which consists of 32 telephones in I, 19 in II and 21 in III, according to A. M. Chisholm, chief telephone foreman.

The Unit I system includes one in Rainbow Village, one for the garage and heavy equipment shop and one which covers the Military Police and Green Village district. All 72 stations terminate on separate jacks at the Unit I fire department switchboard.

Residents are asked to familiarize themselves with the location and number of the nearest alarm box and give this information to the fire department when making emergency calls. This will help the efficiency of the system and will assist the department in responding to the calls.
