2500 Pinedale Center Evacuees Expected

Approximately 2500 additional evacuees who will be arriving largely from the Pinedale Reception Center in central California are expected to arrive here late today in groups of five hundred. The intake period will continue for 5 days. The majority of the new evacuee group will be housed in Camp 2. Intake Center and Housing and Registration Depts., have been set up in the southern camp and the personnel now totals approximately 100. Nine men and 8 women from the general Intake Center staff have been assigned to assist in the operations at Camp 2, and will temporarily reside there during the new intake period. With the arrival of the last group of 500 evacuees on Wednesday of next week, Poston's population is expected to exceed 14,000.

Maintenance crews, today, are preparing the Press Bulletin Camp 2 office which is located in Apts. 8-A and B, Block 215. No newspaper executive position, however, will be permanently filled either at Camp 1 or 2 office until the last evacuee group has arrived.

110 Registered For Repatriation

Various desires--desire to return to their native land, to see their families, and other reasons, prompted 110 persons to register Monday and Wednesday, in compliance to the announcement made recently by Blk. Mgrs., that those desiring to go to Japan, should sign up at Blk. 18, Housing and Registration Office.

Approximately 40 of the 110 who volunteered to be repatriated, represented their families as well as themselves.

Those persons, if they go, will probably be sent about the middle of August, to some neutral country, thence to Japan, in the manner employed with the last group.

Shoe Repair

Two shoe-repair men of long experience, Junichi Maeda and Gunjiro Mitsuhashi, and one apprentice, George Ogata attended the first meeting of their trade called Thursday, afternoon at 1:30 in Rec. 37, by Henry Odagawa, organizer of business enterprises.

The main problem was whether the expensive, but essential machinery would be provided by the government or purchased by the community; and whether lacking the equipment, they would be forced to repair by hand or, anticipating a rush business that would swamp them, especially if machines were not available, or give up entirely the idea of shoe-repair shops in Poston.
