MANPOWER COMMISSION REACHES FIVE DECISIONS

First Group Now Stationed at Shelby

First Battalion, 442nd Infantry, Camp Shelby, Mississippi is now the address of the first group called for active duty from Poston, according to a delayed news release dated June 13.

Arriving at Shelby on June 10, Shiyoichi Matsubara, George T. Miyada and Hideo Shigemawa were assigned to Headquarters Company; while Teijiro Namatame and Itsuo J. Ogawa were assigned to Company "A". Norman S. Okamoto was assigned to Company "C"; and Tom S. Aochi, Takeo Eno, Sumio Nishi and Chester S. Okimoto are now members of Company "D".

According to the medical report on the inductees from the relocation centers, most of the men are in good physical condition, the news release added.

55 RESIDENTS TO LEAVE FOR CANNERY

Fifty women and girls and five men are scheduled to leave tonight for the Woods Cross Cannery in Clearfield, Utah, the relocation division reports.

Also leaving are four workers for the Kayville cannery.

The remainder of the men signed up for the Calpac and Woods Cross canneries will leave in the near future.

There will probably be no more cannery employment offers, the relocation division adds.

All evacuees having household goods and personal property stored in the Koyosan Betsuin Temple at 342 E. First Street, Los Angeles, California are requested to appear in the Unit I Evacuee Property Office to sign a Limited Power of Attorney. The Limited Power of Attorney is being given to Rev. Ryoso Sogabe, minister and custodian of the temple, in order that he may be able to assist the Transportation Division of the WRA at the time of the removal of the property from the temple to the government warehouse.

This is necessary in order that the Evacuee Property Division of the WRA may request a military permit for Rev. In the future any registrant who fails to report for induction physical examination, whether or not he is on the project at the time the Induction Station is here to examine, will be reported to the U.S. attorney, a letter from Sgt. R.L. Porter of Phoenix informs James D. Crawford, selective service representative.

This means that those called for induction will no longer be allowed to leave the project.

Pvt. Shiomichi writes, "This may take you by surprise, after a year of silence, but this is Pvt. Shiomichi in on the beam from Italy. Yes, we're finally over here and getting prepared for the final test--kinda wish we were in Poston again but a great deal of water has gone under the bridge since those good old days.

"Kobe Shoji is here in the same group, in fact, in the same battalion. He broke his arm just before leaving America and still has his arm in a cast--otherwise he's fine and healthy.

"Take care of the students back there and we'll try to do our best up there. Please extend my sincerest regards to the teaching staff. Most sincerely, Joe."

22 HOGS SLAUGHTERED

Twenty-two hogs have been slaughtered during June 12 to 16 the Agriculture Department reports.

The harvest for June 19 to 23 will amount to 12,000 pounds of cucumbers, 15,000 pounds of daikons, 12,000 pounds of beans, 10,500 pounds of shi-uro uri, 15,000 pounds of carrots, and 4,500 pounds of tomatoes.

The Agriculture Department reports that the harvesting of barley is underway in all three units. Combines are working daily to speed the harvesting.

JAPANESE STILL BANNED FROM COAST

Present restriction against the return of persons of Japanese ancestry to the Pacific Coast areas have not been lifted and any future policy changes will "hinge entirely on changes in the military situation," stated Secretary of War Stimson, recently according to a U.P. dispatch.

NISEI SOLDIER'S MOTHERS WEAR PINS

Before the Jerome Relocation Center in Southeast Arkansas closes at the end of June, all of the 155 service mothers of this wartime Japanese-American community will have lapel pins with one star for each son in uniform, the War Relocation Authority announced today.

Arrangements for purchasing the pins have already been made by the USO club of the relocation center, and delivery is expected in the near future. One-star pins have been ordered for 122 of the mothers; two-star pins for 18; three-star pins for 10; and four-star insignia and might possibly lay claim to an additional star since she has a son-in-law as well as five sons in the service.

(continued from 1st page) maintained for the sake of seed production, but that the number of men should be limited to not more than six in any unit, with the rest of the quota being filled by women.

Three, the Commission also recommended that men janitors in the administration barracks be replaced by women; and four, that the janitors in the administration buildings should be retained in present numbers, providing they are unable to do other work by reason of age or other condition.

Five, it was unanimously agreed that fish culture should be terminated.

Figures on current employment in all departments of the project were presented to the Commission, which will continue meeting twice weekly to draft recommendations for reductions in all quotas to meet the decreasing labor supply.

They urge that the children take advantage of the opportunity. July is a month of vacation for the schools except for some vocational courses offered to high school students, they said.
