RELOCATION PROCEEDING AT STEADY PACE, SAYS MYER

W.F.A. to Release Men on Seasonal Jobs For Army Induction

Field Officers have been reporting some difficulty with the evacuees who have been out on seasonal leaves on the basis that they have been ordered to report for their inquestion.

The war rood administration mes agreed to release such men and provide transportation if definite proof of the order is furnished. Letters or wires from lineds within the project will not be accepted as sufficient evidence.

The .. FA and Field Officers Helocation will arrange the termination of seasonal labor contracts on the . presentation of induction notice by evacuee or telegraphic notification from the project director, according to a wire addressed to Duncan mills, project director, from D. S. Myer.

EXCLUSION SUIT FILED

Charging that military authorities have no legal power to exclude loyal Nisei from the Pacific Coast area since there is no military necessity which would justify the exclusion the American civil Liberties Union last ded. filed an injunction suit on bethree Misei half of against NIE 1 Gen. Charles H. Bonesteel, Western Defense Commander.

The suit, a test case, was filed by Atty. A. L. Mirin Joining with the ACLU attorney in the suit are J.B. Fietz another attorney for the Union, Saburo Kido, JACL president and a number of Los Angeles Attorneys.

The three plaintiffs are Shizuko Shiramizu of Camp II, widow of Eiyoshi Shiramizu, who was killed in action in Italy; Mesaru Beba, honorably discharged in 1942, and George O. Chikubo, a farmer-dentist of Topaz center.

The case will be held in the superior court on July 21. ginning approximately two years ago the program of evacuee resettlement has developed to its present stage where a network of 38 "RA field officers and many organized groups and individuals are actively helping evacuees to relocate and become satisfactorily adjusted," he stated.

"No longer need an evacuee resident of a center wonder how he will be accepted and how he will make his living in an outside

city or town.

"The experimental stage of relocation is over. The policy, regulations and procedures are well established to enable evacuees to leave relocation centers and toresettle in communities of their choice where they can lead normal lives in every sense of the word."
