

Big-Send Off Planned For Boys Leaving For Active Duty

TWO POSTONIANS KILLED IN ACTION

Two names were added to the nation's honor roll when wires were received by relatives of Pfc. Shichizo Toyota and T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto, both of the 442nd Battalion now stationed in Italy, that they were killed in action on July 13 and 17.

Pfc. Toyota, formerly of Gilroy, Calif. was transferred from the Salinas Assembly Center to Camp II, where he was employed by the Unit II Community Activities section.

He volunteered sometime last year, and completed his training at Camp Shelby, Miss., before he went over.

He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Shujiro Sakamoto, 215-1-C, 21st St., Poston, Ariz. His brothers, Teri, Toshi, and four others, are in the army, and Yoshio, now a private overseas.

T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto is formerly of San Pedro, Calif., where his folks had been farming prior to evacuation. Sakamoto was drafted on February 21, 1942, and spent training months in various Army Camps before being transferred to Camp Shelby, in the 442nd Battalion.

Surviving him are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Uhachi Sakamoto, 226-B-2, and three brothers, Tom, Sueo and Susumu.

Both boys will be honored with the nation's oldest military award, the Purple Heart.

WISEI WORKERS DISMISSED

Fifty-nine Japanese-American trackmen were dismissed by the Illinois Central Railroad as a result of a threatened strike by some 800 employees, according to the July 29 issue of the Los Angeles Examiner.

J. L. Beven, president of the Illinois Central, states that the men were taken out of service by request of the US Army, until their records could be checked by the War Department. If the records are found satisfactory, these men will probably be put back on the I. C. pay roll.

MELONS AND VEGETABLES HARVESTED

With the melon season almost at an end, only 40,000 lbs. of honeydew will be harvested during the period from July 31 to August 5. Other vegetables to be harvested will be 3,000 lbs. of tomatoes, 4,000 lbs. of shiro uri and 6,000 of dry onions, according to the Unit I Agriculture Department.

MORE TEACHERS BEING HIRED

The recruitment of secondary school teachers have better success than ever before, but school officials are having difficulty with the elementary school staff, stated Dr. Arthur L. Harris, Superintendent of Education.

Next semester will find more Caucasian teachers here, but not because there has been an increase in the allotment. Instead there has been a decrease in the allotment. The allotment provides for 51 secondary school teachers and 41 elementary school teachers in addition to the administrative and supervising staff which consists of four principals, two assistant principals, one vocational counselor, and supervisor for the teachers, adult education and vocational training.

MILLS NOTES WATER USE CUT

In an acknowledgement of the reduction in water usage by Unit I residents during one week, Dunean Mills, project director, asked Dick Nishimoto, block managers' supervisor, to convey to the residents through the block managers' organization, his appreciation of this effort, in a letter dated July 27.

"I have received," the letter reads, "the Daily Water Report for July 25, 1944, which shows that the amount of water used in Unit I on that day was 2,398,690 gallons.

"This is a considerable reduction over the days of the previous week and is an indication of effectiveness of the work of the Block Managers and the residents in curtailing the use of water.

"Will you please convey to the residents through your Block Managers' organization my appreciation of this effort. It is encouraging to see a problem of this kind so effectively handled by the community itself, and a tribute to your organization.
