HOW TO SEND CHRISTMAS CARDS AND PACKAGES OVERSEAS TOLD

Ilthour hit is still four months before Christmas, Clarence Johnson, project postmaster, reminds residents of the fact that all Christmas cerds or percels for soluters overseas should be sent ouring September Land October 15.

All christmas greeting cards for sodiers overseas must be sent in sealed envelopes prepaid t first class mail. All packages should be sent parcel post. No requests are necessary from a solution to send a parcel during this period.

Christmes prickages chall not exceed by pounds in weight, 15 inches in length, or 36 inches in length and girth combined, Due to the creat distance this meil must be transported, and the handling storage it must and undergo, it is absolutely necessary that all articles be packed in boxes of metal, wood, solid fiber board, or strong double - faced corrugated wood, reinforced with strong gum tepe or tied with These strong twine. boxes should also be wrapped inheavy paper. combination .inen

packages are made up such as miscellaneous toilet articles, hard candies, soap, etc., the contents should be tightly packed in order that the articles may not be loosened or dem-

The public is urged not to send food or clothing. Perishable goods will not be accepted. The sending of fragile articles is also discouraged.

than one Not more package will be accepted in the same week from the same person to the same addressee. Parcels should show, in addition to the name of the addressee · name, sender, the rank, army serial num-ber, branch of service, organization, APO number of addressee and post office.

One should not guess at the postage rate as all matter must be rully paid for. No written message should be enclosed within the package except Christmas greetings of some sort.

No mail matter shall be accepted as insured mail. If money is desired, money orders should be sent instead of cash.

LIFE-SAVING -- PENNICILLIN

NOW AVAILABLE AT HOSPITAL

YESTERDAY:

Little Johnny Sugita, age 12, once a carefree, fun-loving boy filled with mischief, as is typical of boys everywhere lay critically ill, his life a mere shadow of what it was formerly, as a result of a ruptured appendicitis with the setting in of blood poisoning. As a pendulum sways, so was his life swaying -- between life and death:

But in the distance was hope -- penicillin, the miracle drug! But perhaps that distance was too far to reach, for penicillin is reserved for the armed forces and is not on the market for civilian use. Through the painstaking efforts of Dr. A. Pressman, penicillin was promised to save little Johnny's life, by the Regional Army Hospital on Davis Mt. in Tucson, Ariz., after first contacting the Denver Medical Denot, where Poston's medical supplies are obtained.

Within 24 hours, the penicillin arrived, but it was not used for little Johnny. As the saying goes "Where there's a will, there's a way," and Johnny's will to live had won out. In the face of death, Johnny had made one last stand and had won out, on "old man" death. Defeated, death had faded out of the picture and in his stead stood "lady" hope with all her banners waying.

Although Johnny did not need the penicillin in his fight with death, that penicillin Johnny did not use will remain here in Poston to bring hope to the patients whose lives will hang as though on a swaying branch between life and death. Penicillin the hope of mankind—the drug to bring life back to the gallant men and women, who are fighting, struggling, and dying to make the world a place of love and happiness — the drug of hope so that little boys and girls like little Johnny need not die, for they are the leaders of the world of tomorrow, where peace will be had and perhaps that dream of Utopia will come true. Truly, penicillin is the life-restoring drug—a dream come true!
