## KEEPING WEIGHT OF BAGGAGE DOWN TO 150 POUNDS ASKED

Warehouse division and the men who pick up baggage for evacuees leaving the center, ask that the weight of each bag be kept down to 150 pounds. Any number of baggages can be made, providing the weight is as requested.

Hitherto, sufficient help was provided for the warehousemen and those who collect the baggage, however, this is not the case now. Each man is overloaded with work and in many cases, baggage weighing well over 300 pounds must be loaded on to the trucks with only two-man crews.

At Parker, each baggage is weighed. This work is also being done by the driver and his helper due to the lack of help at Parker. Immediate cooperation by the evacuees is re-

quested. Otherwise, the baggage will remain here or in Parker for an indefinite period of time.

## DRAFT EVADERS PICKED UP

Nine evacuee residents who refused to take their pre-physical exams or inductions during the week of August 7 - 11, were taken by the United States Marshall, Friday to Phoenix where they appeared before the United States Commissioner, according to Charles L. Harper, chief of internal security.

The one who refused the pre-physical was Tamotsu Tom Fujioka, 11-11-B. The eight who refused induction are: George Imoto, 3-7-B; Sadao Matsubara, 4-2-B; Leo Kanahara, 5-2-A; George Masashi Murata, 43-2-C; Yoneo Nakashima, 30-6-B; George Sugita, 28-10-A; Migeiki Nakamura, 48-1-B; and Samuel Yamada, 40-1-C.

Five more refused induction at Phoenix, but their names were unobtainable at printing time.

## GIRL WAR PLANT WORKERS WANTED IN CLEVELAND

Cleveland, O., August 18---A very attractive job in a war plant making parts for rocket ships and bombers, has just opened for a large number of Nisei girls in Cleveland. Inexperienced girls will be taught drilling, deburring, assembling, packing and inspecting operations at a high rate of pay, which starts at 70¢ an hour, goes to 75¢ after 30 days, and then, to 80¢ after 3 months. After those increases, further pay raises are possible based on merit. Time and a half is paid after 40 hours and a 58 hour week can be worked although it can be adjusted downward if the girls do not wish to work that many hours.

Working conditions in the light and airy factory are good. Excellent food is served by the company operated cafeteria at reasonable prices, and the woman who is in charge of the personnel department will assist girls in housing and transportation problems that might arise.

At this writing, five Nisei are already employed at the company and are apparently well satisfied with their jobs.

When Suji displayed the medal to some friends including a Chronicle reporter, someone asked her whether the profile in gold was that of George Washington.

"I hope so," she answered, laughing. "It sure isn't Emperor Hirohito!"

School will start on full-day schedule, September 4, in Units II and III, for both elementary and high schools. For Unit I high starting date is not certain, but will be either September 4 or 11; the uncertainty is due to speculation as to whether some classes can be conducted in the new high school plant. Unit I elementary school began August 7, and is being conducted on a half-day session, which will be conducted during August and September. Full-day session for Unit I elementary school will begin October 2, according to Dr. Arthur L. Harris, superintendent of education.

The program will be a courtesy affair honoring block managers, women's club members, unit administrators, and officials, visitors from Units II and III. Admittance will be by invitation only.

Applications may be made by girls of 17 or over, high school graduates, who are in good health by contacting Miss Elizabeth Vickers.

Here I am in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, the "home of breweries and America's Dairyland." It has been a month almost to the day since saying good bye to good old Boston, and will say that it takes just about that long for one to get acclimated to the outside atmosphere. For the first couple of weeks, the first thought that comes to you is to chuck the whole thing and return to the center. But, as time passes by, as it has the habit of doing, one gets accustomed to the outside life, and right now, I am enjoying this life very much.

Housing conditions here and in Chicago are not too good. It appears that higher priced, good houses and apartments are much harder to find than cheaper and mediocre housing, due to the fact that everybody is making good money, and consequently, moving into better pieces. It took me two full days of "apartment hunting" to find a small apartment for two men, and another couple of weeks to find a fair family apartment. The saying here in Milwaukee regarding housing is as follows: "Trying to find a good house is like trying to find a perfect wife - mighty difficult but not impossible."

Work opportunities are plentiful, but here's a warning! In actuality, the great majority of them are not nearly as attractive as they sound on paper. Wages in Chicago averages 75¢ per hr. and here 70¢ per hr. (Cont. to next issue)

A memo from H. K. Rosimine, CC Food Committee chairman, was read stating that Mr. Snelson gave a favorable decision on the proposal of employing seamstresses under the subsistence department to repair aprons and sew tofu bags. Mr. Snelson has requested three positions for this class of work in the 2nd quarter budget thus making an opening in each unit.

Was Honda, member of the temporary committee on use of auditorium gave his report as follows: A charge of 10 per cent on the gross will be made if a charge affair is held at the auditorium. A deposit of \$1.00 per key will be requested and there are 7 keys.
