MEMORIAL SERVICES TONIGHT

Memorial services will be held for Pfc. John Tsuyoshi Yamamoto, and Pvt. Joe Shiomichi, at Block 4 Stage at 8:30 tonight. Pfc. Yamamoto and Pvt. Shiomichi were killed in action July 15 and 19 respectively, in Italy, while fighting with the 442nd infantry. Master of ceremonies for the evening will be Minoru Okamoto, local council chairman.

Raising of the flag by the Boy Scouts Color Guard will be followed by the giving of sacred names by Rev. Ryuei Masuoka. Sutra chanting by the reverends of all three camps, and the burning of incense by families of the boys and relatives while the chanting is going on will follow.

Incense burning will also be by representatives of various organizations. Memorial addresses will be given by persons representing organizations of Poston. Fires

SHIOMICHI LAUDED IN NEWS STORY

In the August 13 issue of the Milwaukee Journal, an article was written about Miye Shiomichi, widow of the late Pvt. Joe Shiomichi reported killed in action July 19, while fighting with the 442nd infantry, in Italy.

The story stated Mrs. Shiomichi was "cheerfully awaiting the arrival of her baby, who is due any day now." *

The story stated also: "Almost at the same time Miye was notified of her husband's death, she got a letter from a friend, extending condolences because of the death in action of her brother, Shaw Aiyaku, also with the 442nd."

Also: "Miye met Joe while they were attending the University of California at Berkeley. Joe came from Brawley, Calif., and was only one year away from graduation when Pearl Harbor was attacked on Dec. 7, 1941. Shortly thereafter all persons of Japanese ancestry were removed from the west coast, and Miye and Joe met again at a relocation center in Poston, Ariz., and were married.

"Joe volunteered for army service, and after long waiting, finally was called in October, 1945. He was assigned to the 442nd infantry, the second all-Japanese regiment to be formed, and finally went to Italy last April."

At the conclusion of the story, the comment was made: "That it is being an American."

This restriction has been found necessary because of the special situation at Tule Lake and the difficult administrative problems created when other evacuees visit the center.

Hereafter, permission to visit Tule Lake will be granted only to those persons having an urgent reason for making such visits. Death or serious illness in the immediate family will be considered sufficient cause for granting visiting permits. Other reasons for visiting the center will not be recognized except in special cases. Servicemen in uniform will be given special consideration.
