About 25 boys will report for their pre-induction physical examinations next Monday, September 11, at Phoenix, according to Herbert W. Carter, who is now in charge of selective service matters. Induction calls are slated for Monday, September 18.

SIGNS FOR COMMUNITY BENEFIT, PRESSMAN REMINDS

Signs which were posted at all swimming pools of Units 1 and 2, August 21, warning of the pollution of the canal water, have already been removed, just as similar signs which were posted for protection of Poston residents have been removed each time they have been posted by the health department, according to Dr. A. Pressman, principal medical officer here. All signs posted hereafter should be allowed to remain in place until removed by the health department.

COMBINING ADJACENT MESS HALLS CONSIDERED AT MANPOWER MEETING

At its regular Friday meeting on September 1, the Manpower Commission considered a request from the Project Director that a recommendation be submitted with reference to the combining of adjacent mess halls where the total meals served were equal to or less than the capacity of one mess hall.

FOUR CHARGED WITH ASSAULT

At a preliminary hearing held last Saturday morning, charges and complaints were filed against four evacuee residents of Poston by the WRA.

Charged with assault and battery and with acts inimical to the operation of the WRA project, the four defendants, Frank Koga, Yoneo Nakashima, Junichi Yamasaki and Victor Tanaka, pleaded not guilty before Project Director Duncan Mills.

The trial is to be held this morning.

In his memo to the ~~Commissioner of Manpower~~ Duncan Mills pointed out the critical shortage of manpower in essential activities and the need for conservation of workers in order to prevent a breakdown in project operation. Two sample combinations were cited which would result in savings of 17 to 20 workers, respectively. The proposal is to be presented to the residents of the local units for approval or alternate suggestions.

In addition, the following recommendations were made to the Project Director: (1) that the manpower shortage existing in the slaughter house be met by reassignment of workers within the division. (2) that unit administrators and block manager supervisors be requested to recruit workers for the subsistence and Parker warehouse crews.

Finally, a report was requested to determine why the fish culture project had not been discontinued in accordance with recommendation of the Commission.

JAPANESE SHOULD BE PERMITTED RETURN TO WEST COAST SAYS SANTA ANA REGISTER EDITORIAL

Attorney-General Fiddle says it is up to the Army whether the American Japanese are permitted to return to the West Coast. It seems stretching the case a good ways to give the Army this authority. Especially is this true since we are driving the Japanese Navy to cover.

It is a matter of fact we should never have moved away the Japanese from their homes and their work. It was un-American, unconstitutional and un-Christian. Real Democracy, Christianity and Americanism means that people must live a dangerous life. They must have faith in other people and be willing to take risks. We should have been willing to take the risk that possibly a few Japanese might have caused a disturbance.

But since we have made a serious mistake, the sooner we correct it the better. There is no excuse whatever now for keeping the Japanese in detention camps. They are entitled to the same protection by the government as every other citizen no matter what color or race.--

AMACHE BEATS UNIT I TWICE, LOSES TO III

The Amache nine twice defeated the so-called Delano All-stars, 4-1 and 5-4, on Friday and Sunday evenings, before an estimated crowd of 2,500 ardent ball fans, although outhit of both cases, 4-3 and 7-4. The All-stars were bolstered by a few Camp II players.

J. Hoshizuka walked, then stole second. A sacrifice advanced him to third, and a squeeze play brought in the runner, for Amache's initial tally in the first stanza.

A single by Kawamura scored Kitagawa in the second, to make the score 2-0, in favor of Amache.

A fly by Ioka into left field was dropped to score G. Watanabe and M. Nishijima, for two more runs in the third frame for Amache.

The end of the ninth rolled around with no runs scored since the third, for either team. With two gone, it looked as though "Lefty" would be credited with a shutout. The undaunted All-stars proved otherwise, however, when Tsuda climbed atop the initial bag, advancing to second on a fielder's choice. Then L. Nishijima connected solidly to plaster a sharp single between short and third, to tally Tsuda, marring a possible whitewashing. Noby Itami flew out to center to end all other possible threats.

Promoter Noby Itami, twirling the distance, held Amache to three scattered bingles, but walks, sacrifices and errors in the first three innings proved his downfall. "Lefty" Nishijima, former resident of Poston, did equally well for the victors, being touched for only four bingles in nine innings.



The latter tilt brought Amache three tallies in the top of the first, when T. Ono tripled into the left-field garden, driving in two runs, and then scoring on a fly into deep center.

W. Nakayama singled with two mates aboard, driving one into home, making the score 3-1, at the end of the initial inning.

The All-stars knotted up the score in the fifth frame. Hirozawa stole second after being passed, and tallied on T. Tsuda's single into right, Tsuda rounding the bases to third on a miscue, and sliding safely home on K. Yamaguchi's slow-roller to first.

In the next inning Delano clutched the lead, when T. Hiroyama singled L. Nishijima into paydirt.

With the score standing at 4-3 in the eighth, the All-stars leading, Amache rallied to score twice, as Watanabe crossed home on Y. Oro's ground ball to the keystone sack, and Nishijima tallying when Shimizu grounded out to the catcher.

A last inning attempt to regain the lead went to naught, as S. Hayashi was thrown out when attempting to steal third, with two outs.

Batteries for the game were E. Shiro pitching and T. Ono catching for Amache, and W. Nakayama pitching and T. Hiroyama catching for the hosts.

Officiating the games were Denny Fukushima, calling balls and strikes, Ruy Furuta at first, and Shig Edow at third.

Playing Saturday afternoon at the Yankoe Stadium, the Camp III All-stars defeated Amache, in a see-saw battle. The final score was 13-11.

First to score was S. Watanabe, who with one out hit a hot grounder on the third-base line for a double and an error by the left-fielder brought him all the way around.

In the second, Amache scored again when they pulled three runs across the plate.

Camp III then came back in the second to also score three runs, two on errors.

Camp III now trailing 4-3 at the end of the second, came across with two runs, both on a three-bagger by F. Morikawa into deep center.

With Amache trailing by one run in the fifth inning, they scored two runs to pull them out into the lead once again.

Camp III then came back to pull a hit, when M. Miyamoto hit a looping home-run into deep center, and one more run scoring on a triple by F. Tanaka.

At the first of the ninth, with Amache on the short end of a 11-6 score, they broke loose to score five runs, to tie up the score.

B. Inouye broke up the game in the final frame, when he smashed a home run over deep center with one on, to win the ball game for Camp III.
