EX COUNCILMAN PFC. MURAKAMI IS WOUNDED

Word has been received that Pfc. Yuki to N. Murakami, son of Mrs. Sano Murakami, formerly of 44-5-B, was wounded in action in Italy on August 31.

Pfc. Murakami reported for active duty from Poston in August, 1943 at Ft. Douglas, Utah, and was assigned to duty with the 442nd Combat Team.

Formerly of Irvine, Calif. where he was a farmer, Pfc. Murakami was the first councilman elected from Block 44. A graduate of Tus tin Union high school, he was in the engineering department here before he was called.

He has three brothers and two sisters, all former residents of Poston. His mother and sisters left in May of this year for Delta, Colo. to join the boys of the family who had relocated there previously. One of the brothers is also believed to be in the Army.

TWO ASSISTANT CHIEFS CHOSEN

Henry Minoru Ono of Block 11, former police captain, and Keijiyo Uyeno of Block 27, councilman, have been appointed assistants to Kazuma Matsumoto, new chief of police.

The work consists in unloading ammunition from railroad freight cars onto vans or trucks, and storing in large igloos, Mr. Hayano said.

CHICAGO WRA ADOPTS NEW PLAN FOR BETTER PLACEMENT SERVICE

Chicago, Ill.--(Special) In order to make the hiring of Japanese American a more normal procedure for employers, and to place the settled Japanese Americans in the same situation as other Chicagoans seeking jobs, all ~~employment~~ employment cases will hereafter be referred to the U. S. Employment Service for placement, following a newly inaugurated plan, according to G. Raymond Booth, manager of the WRA Chicago office.

Under this plan, persons coming from

centers will be given more service than previously possible when many persons already established in the city were being assisted in securing second, third or fourth jobs. The U.S. Employment Service has experienced little difficulty in placing the many people who have already availed themselves of its services and assures the Chicago WRA that they can adequately handle all re-employment cases who apply directly to the Employment Service rather than to WRA, Mr. Booth said.

WAR DEPARTMENT RELEASE TELLS OF SOLDIER WHO DIED URGING THAT OTHERS BE TREATED FIRST

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--In a dark first aid station of the Fifth Army front in Italy one night recently, lay a casualty of the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team.

His outfit at the time was fighting with the 34th "Red Bull" Division. He had been hit while leading an assault on Hill 140, dubbed "Little Cassino" by the men because of fierce German resistance reminiscent of their stand further south.

In the darkness, the medics were calling for the most seriously wounded for treatment. Coming to him, a first aid man asked how he was.

"I'm all right," was his reply. "The others need more help than I."

The medic went on to another patient. Asked again how he was feeling, the Japanese American, a corporal in a cannon company, answered, "I'm feeling fine. Treat the others first."

As a result of his repeated assurance, the soldier, whose home before his family had been evacuated, was Los Angeles, Calif., was among the last to be treated.

Both of his legs had been blown off by a direct hit from a German 88. Evacuated, he died the next night.

The Depot is about 37 miles from Salt Lake City, 3 1/2 miles from Toole, and covers about 29,000 acres. The climate ranges from 93 degrees in summer to 0 degree in winter, Mr. Hayano was told.

Outside the central storage area is a residential area whose housing capacity is 1800 families. Tod Park, as it is called, has all kinds of stores--grocery, drug, beauty shop, post office; schools--nursery, kindergarten and elementary up to the sixth grade; an auditorium for social gatherings, with a weekly dance,

and movies about three times a week.

There are about four apartments to each unit, with size varying according to the size of the family. Walls are of hollow cast cement, floors are highly polished concrete, and the ceiling is plaster-board. Equipment and furnishings, which are new, include: coal burning range; central heating units; double sink; hot water heater; enamel ice box, china cupboard, kitchen cabinets; beds and mattresses; dining sets; dressers and occasional chairs; window shades. All which is needed to be brought by persons going there are: bedding, linen, kitchen utensils, and dishes, but dishes can be rented for \$1 a week. Rents are: \$25 for a two bedroom apartment, and \$36 for a three bedroom apartment.

According to Mr. Hayano, groceries there cost about 15% less. Hospital charges are \$2.50 a day, for all kinds of services, including operations. The hospital has 200 beds, and has a nursery. Doctor calls are 50¢ each.

Women living in the Tod Park area may work in one of the offices in that area, or go to Toole to work. For a stenographer, the starting wage is \$1440, at the offices.

PATIENTS WILL BE TAUGHT

Arts and crafts instruction for hospital patients is being planned by the adult education section in cooperation with the hospital medical staff, according to David Conlin, adult education supervisor.

This instruction is believed to be valuable as occupational therapy in the treatment of chronic disease. Classes in water colors, wood carving and stone polishing will begin Sept. 26 under Roy Takahashi of the adult education section.

NEW DRAFTING CLASS TO BEGIN

Girls and women who wish to study beginning drafting are asked to register for a new class which will probably begin in October.

Registration date for the Block 21 Sewing School is Sept. 27, from 9 to 11 a.m., according to Miyoko Yoshimura, secretary.

There has not been a date set for registering at the Block 12 school, but it is believed that a similar class will begin there also some time in October.
