

Kitchen Worker Quota Approved

The Manpower Commission recommendation on kitchen worker quotas, made Friday, Sept. 15, and published in the Sept. 19 issue of the Chronicle, has been approved by Duncan Mills, project director, and will go into immediate effect, according to the Manpower Commission.

The employment office is arranging to interview workers who are being released from block kitchens in order to find proper placement for them.

Shortages now exist in the hospital kitchen, subsistence warehouses, Parker warehouse, project offices, tractor division, and in the agricultural division.

Local Fire Prevention Week Proclaimed by Director Mills

Fire Prevention Week has been proclaimed by our President to call to the attention of the people the tremendous losses of life and property which are being caused by uncontrolled fires.

The appalling fact is that 7,500 persons in the United States are burned to death each year by fires originating in the home. Most of these so killed are women and helpless children. Every day \$1,000,000 worth of property goes up in smoke in the United States, much of it the result of carelessness or lack of knowledge of the principles of fire prevention.

We in Poston are particularly vulnerable. Our wooden structures dried by several years of desert heat are highly susceptible to fire. Carelessness on the part of one resident of the center could easily endanger the lives of many persons.

Therefore I direct that, for the common good of all, every person shall, during the week of October 8-14, and thereafter, pay particular attention to fire prevention by refraining from acts of carelessness and informing himself as to proper procedure in case of fire.

DUST IN DESERT

The Parker Valley High School faculty staff is livened up by an interesting teacher with lots of war experience behind him. He is Dr. Raymond Rien a former Colonel in the Royal Air Force.

His story to one of our reporter was as follows:

Aside from his teaching, he has seen action in two world wars. The first war saw him as a major in the Royal Canadian Air Force in England.

The second world war found him this time with the R.A.F. as a colonel in charge of a base. He also helped train Nisei in the R.A.F.

After the battle of Dunkirk, the British put up every available plane and person. Dr. Rien flew in the cockpit of the famed Spitfire fighter and went over sixteen times without a mishap. Being shot down and placed in a German concentration camp on his seventeenth trip, Dr. Rien found a new life.

After 1 year, 11 months and 14 days of this prison life, he escaped Germany through Holland going through many harrowing experiences.

It was during this escape that he made up his mind that if he got out he would do the best work he could offer to the people...and he has chosen Poston as the place where he could carry on his work best, after being mustered out of Air Force because of night blindness.

The records, which were made available to the public through Dr. A. S. Pressman's consent, reveal that there was a total of 249 babies born in the one-year period from September, 1943 to August, 1944. Out of this total, 118 were male and the others female, putting the privileged sex ahead by 13.
