Pfc. Kiyoshi Shintaku, 31, was slightly injured in action on the Italian battlefield, Sept. 16, a wire from the War Department has informed his mother, Mrs. Toka Shintaku, 219-1-C. Pfc. Shintaku has already been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action on May 13, while he was a private.

The wounded soldier is a former resident of Salinas, Calif., where he operated a filling station until he was inducted into the Army four days before the Pearl Harbor attack. First sta-

### About 11,000 Remain

Indefinite leaves from Poston passed the 5,000 mark on Tuesday, Sept. 19, when 5,040 were recorded by the statistics section as having gone out from the center to find new jobs and new homes.

On Sept. 27, a total of 5,058 indefinite leaves was reported, with 11,004 still remaining in the center. Over 750 are out on seasonal leaves and about 175 are out on short term permits.

The Sept. 27 figure indicates a reduction in population of about 8,000 people, since August, 1942, when the peak population of 17,942 was noted. Segregation, the Gripsholm exchanges and Crystal City transfers account for most of the non-relocation permanent leaves.

### COMMUNITY ASKED TO AID IN TAKAHASHI SEARCH

Center residents are asked to report all suspicious characters or clues that may lead to the whereabouts of Isamu Takahashi, wanted for the slaying of May Tsubouchi who succumbed to knife wounds last Saturday night.

The coroner's jury met Monday afternoon and established enough evidence to convict him on a charge of murder. A felony warrant has been issued for his arrest in Yuma county.

135 HAWAIIAN JAPANESE AMONG 2,209 LISTED

The War Department reported 2,209 more soldiers on Sept. 29 as wounded in action, among them 135 from Hawaii who are American citizens of Japanese ancestry, the Arizona Republic reports.

Recently they captured a German command post, complete with a large motor pool and an entire field artillery battery, all intact.

Italian towns recently captured by the 100th Battalion are: Belvedere, Sesseta, Pastina, and Orsiana. Belvedere was taken by a surprise thrust. Sesseta by a flanking attack, Pastina by a frontal attack, and Orsiana by-passed and then completely surrounded.

WASHINGTON RELOCATION  
CHIEF JOINS UNRRA

Edwin G. Arnold, chief of the relocation division, Washington WRA, has accepted a position with the UNRRA as chief of the Far Eastern Division, effective October 1, according to a letter received recently by Duncan Mills.

The announcement said that the casualties occurred in the European and Mediterranean areas, and that the Hawaiians were members of the 442nd Japanese Americans who have been in the thick of the fighting in Italy.

The regiment is made up of the old 100th Infantry Battalion of the Hawaiian National Guard and recruits from relocation centers to which Japanese-Americans were moved from Pacific coast states after the Pearl Harbor attack, the story said.

The 442nd arrived in Italy last May and was attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division, a part of the Fifth Army. A recent dispatch from Italy said the regiment went into action late in June and remained in the line almost a month. Its members were said to have killed 1,124 Germans, captured 331 and wounded several hundred during the fighting for the approaches to Leghorn, Pisa and Florence.

Miss Endo, who had been held at Tule Lake relocation center, last year filed a petition for writ of habeas corpus which was dismissed by a San Francisco Federal Judge. The Judge said that Miss Endo had not sought to secure her release under War Relocation Authority regulations. The case was brought before the Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco this Spring and the Court withheld a decision pending clarification of four questions. Miss Endo is backed by the Northern Calif. Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union.
