Pfc. Thomas Higa, World War II veteran, who is now on a lecture tour sponsored by the Japanese American Citizens League, is scheduled to arrive in Poston on Monday night, and will stay here three days, during which he will address audiences in each of the three units.

He will speak at the Cottonwood Bowl in Unit II on Tuesday night; at the Unit III school assembly hall on Wednesday night, and at Block 4 stage in Unit I on Wednesday night. The programs are scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

Higa's primary purpose in lecturing is, according to the JAACL, to speak in Japanese to parents and relatives of the Nisei GIs (Cont. on City Page)

Block 14 Resident Commits Suicide

Nobuichi Muramoto, 58, a bachelor residing at 14-13-A, died early Wednesday morning at the hospital. He had been rushed there by friends who found him about 2:30 a.m. with his right wrist slashed by a straight razor.

Muramoto, who was a farmhand in McFarland, Calif., prior to evacuation, had just returned to the project from Nampa, Ida., after almost six months of seasonal leave. Since then he had been despondent, according to his roommates. Three days before his death he had confided to a roommate that he did not wish to live.

TWENTY JAPANESE LANGUAGE DRILLMASTERS WANTED BY STANFORD'S CIVIL AFFAIRS TRAINING SCHOOL

Twenty Nisei are needed by the Civil Affairs Training School at Stanford University, as conversation and drill leaders, according to a release received from Stanford University.

The Civil Affairs Training School is preparing Army and Navy officers for the responsibilities of military government in enemy territory in the period immediately following the cessation of hostilities.

A first group of

drill leaders will be employed September 15, and another group January 1, the employment lasting at least six and possibly nine months. A maximum of four hours per day in leading practice groups will be expected from the Nisei instructors.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK: OCTOBER 8 TO 14

National Fire Prevention week has been annually observed in Poston, yet according to a report from Fire Chief J. M. Fien, during this year alone there has been a property loss occurring from fires that amounts to \$63,000 and "that ain't hay". Of this total \$43,000 is from loss of property belonging to evacuees and cannot be replaced.

For a community the size of Poston this loss is considered tremendous, and its cause in most instances was merely carelessness and neglect of one's duty.

Several issues back the Poston Chronicle published a list of rules on fire prevention which should and could easily be observed by every resident of this center. These rules are more than just precautionary measures. They are certain definite steps which have been taken or which should be taken to eliminate and reduce fire hazards that may easily turn into a catastrophe. Certainly, considering the loss which came from fires during this last year, it would not be too much of a waste of time to remove oily rags from the closet to see to it that inflammable material such as charcoal is removed from places where it would be a danger. Just a few steps efficiently yet simply taken may save someone from losing a lot of stuff "that ain't hay". L. F.

maining two hours the Nisei will lead groups of eight officers each in conversational practice on the new material presented in the instruction hours.

It is not necessary that the Nisei have skill or previous experience as language teachers, although this would be valuable. They must be capable of conducting conversational practice in Japanese among a small group of officers of

ages from 35 to 55. Whenever possible it is preferred that the Tokio dialect be used.

Salary of about \$180 per month should be the standard remuneration for this service, the War Department has indicated. Dormitory accommodations on the campus will be available for single men and women. Family accommodations are not available.

An important phase of this training is to develop considerable proficiency in speaking and understanding the spoken language, and sufficient acquaintance with the written language to enable the officers to follow simple printed instructions, such as street signs and time tables.
