Relocation Offices Will Assist in Preparing Applications

Since evacuation, the Western Defense Command has considered applications from individuals and families who for good reasons desire exemption from the exclusion order, and wish to return permanently to the evacuated area, according to James D. Crawford, relocation program officer.

In the past, the Welfare Section has transmitted applications through the WRA office in San Francisco. From now on, individuals will submit their own applications by writing directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command Civil Affairs Division, Presidio, San Francisco, Cal. Three or four months may elapse between the date of application and the receipt of the final decision from the Western Defense Command.

The relocation division will assist applicants in making plans and preparing applications. Mr. Crawford states the WRA however, cannot make recommendations and will not seek to influence the Western Defense Command in granting such permits. Persons seeking information or help in making plans to return should consult the relocation advisors in the unit offices.

Short term permits to return on legal or property business should be discussed first with the legal office or evacuee property office here.

4-C STATUS CLARIFIED BY PROJECT ATTORNEY

In order to clarify the status of those on 4-C classification, Scott Rowley, project attorney, has issued the following statement:

"Owing to the fact that there has been circulated a summary of draft classifications, there seems to be a misapprehension among many who have been classified as 4-C. The 4-C classification does not necessarily indicate that a person

is not a citizen of the United States. It does include people who are aliens but certain provisions therein also include people who are citizens of the United States."

WRA MANUAL PROVIDES THAT IN THE FUTURE STUDENTS ON VACATION FROM OUTSIDE WILL NOT HAVE TO PAY MEAL OR QUARTER CHARGES

Recent revision of the W.R.A. Manual regulations on Japanese-Americans who are visiting centers, provides that in the future, students who have returned to their families during official vacation periods (when they have not graduated and intend to return to school) will not be charged for either meals or quarters.

CLEVELAND BAPTIST HOSTEL ADOPTS NEW PLAN TO HELP RELOCATE EVACUEES

Designed to help people go to Cleveland as complete family units and to have immediate housing security, a new plan has been announced by the Cleveland Baptist Hostel. The plan calls for progressively turning over the facilities of the hostel to family groups.

Under the plan, a couple and children would live together at the hostel as long as it is necessary or until adequate housing is found. Four sizeable families can be housed at one time. The cost would be \$1.00 a day for an adult and 50¢ a day for each child. Meals are eaten in a group with other hostel residents.

House cleaning chores are shared by all. Max L. Franzen, director of the Cleveland Baptist Hostel, suggests that interested family heads contact the hostel representative or leave officer at each project to make the necessary arrangements.

CHRISTMAS PACKAGES BY 213 FUJINKAI

G.I.s of 213 are going to have a merry Christmas this year, as the Mothers of 213, or the Fujin-kai, is busy packing packages which are to be sent to their block boys all over the war-torn world.

Remember, there are only five more days. Let's all do our part for the boys over there. Oct. 15 is the deadline.

In the past a charge of 20¢ per meal and 20¢ per night for occupancy of living quarters (other than the quarters of the student's family, friends or relatives) was made. Evacuees out on student relocation, however, had pointed out that such charges made to them during their return to the center constituted an undue hardship in view of the fact that they were not wage earners. The above revision was made, therefore, in recognition of their particular problem.
