

MYER CREDITS NISEI SOLDIERS WITH "BEST PUBLIC RELATIONS JOB"

Conduct of Nisei G. I.'s in Battle Convinces Doubters

Japanese - American soldiers are doing the "best public relations work" for all evacuees, said Dillon S. Myer, national WRA director, at a press conference in San Francisco on October 9, according to the WRA locator, a bulletin issued by the WRA San Francisco office.

Nisei soldiers have by their valiant conduct in battle, and the reports of wounded and killed in the service of this country, convinced doubters that their loyalty is without question, said Mr. Myer. As a result, there has been a noticeable disappearance of much of the earlier race hysteria.

He emphasized frequently recurring statements of Caucasian American soldiers that they would stand behind Japanese-Americans against race-baiters as indicative of the acceptance of evacuees by America.

More than 32,000 have been relocated in states outside the military zone in California, Washington and Oregon, he stated.

Chicago is the best location to which to go as far as employment possibilities are concerned, but housing there is a great deal substandard, according to Thomas Masuda, former Poston attorney who has recently resumed law practice in the Windy City. Mr. Masuda returned here last

Friday night and left Tuesday morning for Chicago with his wife, long-time Ad. Bldg. receptionist and more recently secretary to Corlies Carter, relocation officer.

Mr. Masuda left here with George Nishita of Blk. 31 in the spring of this year, on a tour of many relocation states. Together they explored relocation possibilities in such cities as Salt Lake, Milwaukee, Chicago, Cleveland, Boston, Washington, D.C., and New York. Mr. Nishita returned to Poston alone in June, while Mr. Masuda remained in Chicago. Mr. Nishita is now at Seabrook Farms, N.J.

In regard to active duty calls, the selective service office states that none has been received for October 27.
