TWO HERE RECEIVE PERMITS TO RETURN TO CALIFORNIA

Mary Duco, Tadayuki
Todah Are Exempted
From Exclusion Order

Permits allowing Mary Duco, 36-5-C and Tadayuki Todah, 59-10-A, to return to California, were received here Monday from Western Defense Command headquarters in San Francisco.

The two, with four other plaintiffs of this center, filed a test case in Los Angeles Federal Court on September 12. The others were refused exemption from the exclusion order.

Born in Japan, Todah is a naturalized citizen of the United States by reason of having served in the U.S. Army during World War I. Before evacuation he was proprietor of the City Hall Grill opposite the Los Angeles City Hall. He plans to return to the Southland next week for a visit.

Mrs. Duco, who was born in Terminal Island, Calif., also expects to go back soon for a visit.

**Dr. Hachiro Yuasa
Discusses Future of
Japanese in America**

**Says 'Japanese Must Do Twice
As Much, Expect Half As Much'**

Arriving in Poston last Saturday was Dr. Hachiro Yuasa, who is recognized as one of the finest Christian leaders of today. He spoke in Unit I Sunday and Monday and is spending the remaining three days in the other units.

The mission tour which he is making was made last year by Dr. Stanley Jones. This year, because of several requests from the centers, the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America asked Dr. Yuasa to go on the mission tour of which is to discuss the future of the Japanese in this country.

Dr. Yuasa, through personal experience in different countries,

the Negroes in America for generations.

In order to make good in this country, Dr. Yuasa says, the Japanese will have to do twice as much and expect half as much as the other Americans of new stock. This twice as much should be spiritual as well as physical and mental.

There are 1,200 Japanese in New York, his present home, who are trying to make this country their home, and despite the handicap they are making good, he believes. After the present crisis began, he had several chances to repatriate to Japan, but decided to stay and help the Japanese in this country.

Both are renewing acquaintances with their former Maryknoll School (Los Angeles) pupils, who number about 100 here.

Commenting on the furor which arose with the return of Esther Takei, 19-year-old girl from Granada, to attend school there, the editorial says, "That there should be any issue at all--any question of the right of an American citizen of whatever ancestry to attend a public school--constitutes a dismal commentary on the political enlightenment of California's

**JACL TO SEND BOOKS TO
WOUNDED GIS OVERSEAS**

To provide wounded Nisei GIs overseas with books is the purpose of the book club drive which has been announced by JACL national headquarters.

Books have already been purchased by JACL staff members to start the project moving. Book lists are being compiled and contracts are being arranged with leading publishers in order to obtain special rates.

The JACL states that it will accept either monetary donations or the latest books for their drive. It has been suggested that individuals and organizations donating books write a little message inside to the soldiers.

"What shall be done with the Nisei? The question is obvious, for if they or any other minority are denied their constitutional rights, democracy will become a mockery, and our form of government a cruel farce."

The editorial ends by quoting President Roosevelt's proclamation that loyal evacuees shall be restored "the right to return to the evacuated area as soon as the military situation will make such return feasible."

Also printed is a letter from an Ida Emrie who congratulates the Chronicle's stand on Miss Takei's return. "My only and beloved son died in the service of his country only a month ago. He was a student at PJC too--perhaps some of you may have known him. I know he did not hate anyone, even the enemy.. What do you think we are fighting for? This poor Nisei girl had nothing to do with Pearl Harbor... I'm an old woman and my hands are shaky, but I just had to tell you I love you all."

A picture in the same issue shows the newly elected SCA (Student Christian Association?) Board members. Included in the group is smiling Esther Takei.

The editor of the Pasadena junior college newspaper is Carl Palmberg, a discharged veteran of this war.
