Suggestions have been submitted to Dr. Powell which the council believes will be more satisfactory to the residents. The suggestions were as follows:

(1) That all those in the following cate-gories be exempt from the cut-down: a--Male workers 65 years and over. b -- Male workers physically unable perform any other work and holding a doctor's certificate to effect. c--Those blocks having difficulty in securing women replacements may submit their reasons to a special investigating committec. DR. H. YUASA INSPIRES CONGREGATION.

In his two days visit in Unit III, Dr. H. Yuasa gave an inspirational and educational lecture regarding the future of Japanese in America to a capacity congregation in all three places—Chapel I 305, Chapel II 329 and 310 Mess hall.

Being able to attend only one of his lectures but thoroughly impressed at his voice that comes from wide experiences, we present to you parts of the talk he gave to the members of Fujinkai at 310 Thursday afternoon.

In his opinion, he believes that the future of the Nisei lies in America. Being bom and reared here, all opportunity lies in this country for the Nisei looking from a standpoint of economic and social advantages.

He also gave the congregation the pigture of what kind of country merica really is. Knowing that she is not a Christian country but a country striving to live up to Christianity and she is not a democracy but a country trying hard to live up to the ideal, we cannot feel that we are being alscriminated against but must ourselves work toward making democracy a reality in America.

He also stated that there is not one minority group in this country that have not been discriminated against. We ourselves are guilty of it, but we do live in a country that is trying to overcome racial prejudice so it will be up to us to help it. He commended the Nisei soldiers who are sacrificing ther lives to make America a better place for us to live in.
