More Comply with Active Duty Orders

Seven Leave Yesterday,
One Leaves Tomorrow

Seven boys left last night for Ft. Douglas, Utah, in compliance with their active duty orders.

Jimmie Okazaki, 316-14-D, was the last addition to the group. Others leaving were Leonard Ueki, Albert Wakimoto, Victor Tanaka, Isamu Shingai, Kiyoshi Masutani and Kiyoshi Koga.

The only one originally scheduled to leave tomorrow was Richard Kubo. A last-minute addition is Iwao Morishita, 46-7-A, making two who report on Nov. 15.

The active duty calls for Nov. 13, 15 and 20, are not part of the regular monthly call, which was on Wednesday, Nov. 8, this month, it is advised.

Those called on the irregular dates are those on reserve who have been accepted for training at Ft. Snelling, Minn., or those who have been deferred until the later date because they were unable to comply with their first active duty orders for health or other reasons.

The next induction has been set for Wednesday, Nov. 29, but no names have been received as yet.

Block Firemen Plan Suggested by Fien

Volunteer Crews Will
Work Only When Fire
Occurs in Own Block

Because the three unit fire departments are greatly in need of men, a plan has been proposed by J.M. Fien, fire protection officer, which will partially meet the demand for more workers.

Under this plan, each block will organize a volunteer crew of firemen who will not be called upon to work except when a fire occurs in their own block.

When a fire breaks out in any block, its fire crew will, as duties listed under the proposed plan, be expected to (1) call the fire department and direct regular firemen to the site of the fire, (2) secure water guns from their barracks, (3) conduct garden hose watches for spot fires, (4) as (cont. on Unit I page)

IS 50TH CASUALTY FROM THIS CENTER

Pvt. Yukio Sumida, 24, husband of Molly Tsuboichi Sumida of 215 5-B was wounded in action in France on Oct. 22, according to a War Department message late last week. He is the 50th casualty from this center.

The wounded soldier was a selectee, and was inducted three days before Pearl Harbor from Monterey, Calif. He is a 1940 graduate from Monterey Union High School, where he was active in football and basketball. He is of the 442nd Combat Team.

Two brothers are in the army, Pvt. Mitsuo Sumida at Camp Shelby, and Cpl. Takeo Sumida at Ft. Hayes, Ohio.

Another brother resides at 214-12-E.

VETERAN OF ITALIAN CAMPAIGN VISITS POSTON

Pvt. Raymond Matsuda, veteran of the Italian campaign, arrived in Poston Thursday evening for a visit with his friends. He was given a 14-day furlough from the Hammond Hospital at Modesto, Calif., where he is hospitalized at present, recovering from wounds received in action.

He grew up in Honolulu, Hawaii, where his folks are living today. Entering the service about four years ago, he came to the mainland in 1942 for a year of basic training at Camp Shelby with the 442nd Battalion before going overseas

with one of the first American units to land in Italy.

Pvt. Matsuda, who does not talk very freely, tells that he was awarded the Purple Heart medal for wounds received in action on the night of July 22, when his outfit was wait-

ing to be relieved by another. As the men advanced slowly across a riverbed, Pvt. Matsuda stepped on a landmine concealed beneath the soft mud. The explosion injured him in the right leg just below the knee. Unable to go any farther, he lay in the soft mud for almost two hours. Finally at 12:30 that night he was evacuated to another zone and taken to a makeshift hospital where his wounds were treated. He arrived back in the States a few months ago.

He does not know, at present, whether he will be discharged from the Army or not, but he wishes to go back to Hawaii to pick up his life where he left off.
