Volunteer Crews Will Work Only When Fire Occurs in Own Block

Because the three fire departments unit are greatly in need of men, a plan has been proposed by J.M. Fien, fire protection officer, which will parti-ally meet the demand for more workers.

Under this plan, each block will organize a volunteer crew of firemen who will not be called upon to work except when a fire occurs in their own block.
