Greetings May Be Cablegrammed to Overseas Soldiers

Special rate cablegrams may be sent to relatives and friends in the U.S. armed forces overseas, reports Henry Kuwahara of Office Services.

Called "Expeditionary Force Messages" and costing 66¢ these may be sent only to those serving abroad. The sender may have three choices of fixed texts including birthday, Christmas and other seasonal greetings.

Messages will be taken by the Western Union office in the Unit I Ad. Bldg. and the Unit II and III administrators' offices.

It was erroneously reported on the Unit II page Thursday that the messages were sent via Postal Telegraph and cost 76¢.

Minors Relocating Alone to Chicago for Study Must Pay Tuition Fees

Chicago, Ill. - The city of Chicago rules that tuition must be paid where the sole purpose of attending its public schools is given as the reason for an unattached minor coming into the city.

The rule is in no sense discriminatory and is applied equally to all such persons coming into the city. Those accompanied by their parents are accepted without tuition in Chicago as in most, if not all communities in the United States.

Some communities have taken into account the peculiar situation of the evacuees in that the child cannot go to school in the community or state in which his parents are (cont. on Unit I page)

Pfc. Henry S. Izumizaki, 23, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kanetsuchi Izumizaki, 220 S. J., was killed in action in France on Nov. 2, while fighting with the 42nd. His death increases the number of gold stars on the center service flag to eleven.

Pfc. Izumizaki was a volunteer from this center in March, 1943. He was from Watsonville, Calif., where he graduated from Watsonville high school in 1940. He was active in football and a member of the Block "W" society.

Before evacuation he worked on the Boronson farm in Watsonville.

In the center he was a carpenter with the school construction crew. He went overseas in May this year.

His brother, Pfc. James Izumizaki, who is with the 100th, was reported wounded in France on Oct. 17. Another brother, Pvt. Arthur, is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla.

Mr. and Mrs. Takeshi Watanabe, 309 S. A., learned recently from their relocated daughter-in-law that her husband and their son, Ko-zo Watanabe, was missing in action in France. Watanabe was a pre-evacuation inductee (cont. on Unit I page)

STAND UP AND TAKE A BOW, MR. HALE, SIR

There is a gentleman in Parker who runs a barber shop. His name is Andy Hale. He has three sons serving in the U.S. armed forces. There aren't many men like Mr. Hale.

Mr. Hale hails from Texas. Texas is a wonderful state, pod'nuh. That's where all the lovely bluebonnets grow deep in the heart of. That's where all the beautiful women come from, like Linda Darnell and Ann Sheridan, and, well, Linda Darnell. And Texas is the largest state in the Union. Naturally, there aren't many men like Mr. Hale.

As if that weren't enough glory for one man, Mr. Hale is also a man who stands solidly behind his convictions. The world might have never known, and the gem of purest ray serene that is Mr. Hale's integrity, might have remained hidden forever, if it weren't for some thing that happened last week in his barber shop. This is the story:

A World War II veteran spent a couple of days last week in Parker. He was on furlough from a California army hospital where he is still convalescing from wounds received one July night this year in Italy. He had ribbons and things on his chest, among them a Purple Heart medal. His face was battle-scarred and he was using a crutch, because it was his leg that got it when he stepped on a hidden landmine that Italian summer night.

Thinking he could do with a shave on the second day, he walked into Mr. Hale's tonsorial salon. Mr. Hale, a man of action (not many men like Mr. Hale), rushed over to the soldier and helped him outside. "Can't you read?" Mr. Hale asked the soldier. "Keep Out Japs You Rats," the sign outside the shop said.

It was really funny. Here this soldier, a private named Raymond Matsuda hadn't noticed the sign. And imagine, even if he had, he wouldn't have thought it applied to him, he said later. Lord, just because he was born in Honolulu, Hawaii and got called for service in the U.S. Army and trained at Camp Shelby, Miss., and went overseas to Italy and got hurt fighting the Germans and had to lie in the mud a couple of hours before he got evacuated to a make-shift hospital--Lord, just because of little things like that, he had the incredible simplicity to suppose that he was an American. He was probably under the impression that he could walk into any barber shop in the U.S. and get a shave.

Like I said, it was really funny. But Mr. Hale showed him. You bet. Mr. Hale taught Pvt. Raymond Matsuda to look for signs before going into barber shops. Not only Pvt. Matsuda, why, about eight months ago there was another soldier like that, and Mr. Hale says he told him to keep out, too. Because you just can't fool Mr. Hale. He can tell a Jap. A Jap is a Jap is a Jap. "They all look alike to me," he says.

There aren't many men like Mr. Hale
Thank God.

from Dinuba, Calif., and went overseas in August, 1944. He has lived most of his life in Hanford, Calif.

Cpl. John Narimatsu, 25, son of Mr. and Mrs. Mitsui Terakawa, 307-10-D, was seriously wounded in France on Nov. 1, according to a War department message to his sister, Mary Narimatsu.

The wounded soldier is from Reedley, Calif., and is a 1938 graduate of Reedley Union high school. Inducted in February, 1941, he was first stationed at Ft. Ord, Monterey (Calif.), and was assigned to several camps before joining the 442nd at Camp Shelby, Miss. He went overseas last August.

Pfc. Yasuo Nakamoto, 23, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Kichisaburo

Nakamoto, 323-6-C, was slightly wounded on the French front, Nov. 2, it was learned here Thursday.

Pfc. Nakamoto is from San Diego, Calif., and left here with the first group of volunteers in May, 1943. He graduated San Diego high school in 1939 and was active in sports. Before evacuation he was employed in a fish cannery.

Pfc. Haruo E. Mochizuki, 25, son of Eitaro Mochizuki, 6-6-D, was seriously wounded in action in France on Nov. 2, a War department message said yesterday.

Pfc. Mochizuki was drafted a few days after Pearl Harbor, and first trained at Camp Robinson, Ark. After being transferred to several camps, he was assigned to Camp Blanding, Fla., and went overseas in August this year.

Reedley-born, the wounded soldier is a graduate of Sakersfield Union High School. He has two brothers in the Army. One, Pvt. Saburo Mochizuki, is at present overseas in France. The other, Pvt. Akio Mochizuki, was drafted from Chicago, Ill., where he had relocated, and is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla.

Miss Yasuko Inui, sister of Pfc. Haruo Inui, 24, was informed yesterday that her brother was seriously wounded in France on Oct. 29.

The wounded soldier, son of Kumeji Inui, 27-7-D, is from La Habra, Calif., from where he was inducted in January, 1942, while he was still attending high school. His first training was received at Camp Robinson, Ark.

A brother, Pvt. Tomio Inui, is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla.
