Nov 8, 1944

bear Editor:

Since I have manyire his in Poston who might e interested in relocating here with their families. I thought it might be of interest to them to know what's what here at the Topele

Ordnance Depot

... At present there are about forty families settled here, working under Civil Service in a very vital and necessary defense work, and many are coming in every week. These young men and women are setting a record and an example. We on the home front are also doing our share in a big way without a whimper or a cross look, endeavoring to keep the traditional "Co-for-Broke" determination of the fumous 100th Battalion.

I have travelled far and near working with many groups, but this is the very first time I have seen such perfect co-ordination shown by our race of people, where group labor was required. The work of this group, under the oble lead ship of Tom Okamura, a veteran of this war, is constantly being complimented by the officials of this Depot and officials from

Mashington.

l have seen many During this cummer season, dissatisfied men and women in the APA camps Toocle there is absolutely no but here at

criping.

There are many working in the motor pool driving trucks and semie, some in the curpenters and supply but most are working as ammunition handlers. All of this work is done to a military precision that is firm and definite.

There are also many Hisei women employed in the offices and on the outside working as ammunition checkers It is understood that there will be other departments open for women. All of these men and woman do their work with a pride for they know that they are not letting the boys overseas down on the home front.

The living quarters are new apartments with one, two or three bodrooms, fully fur nished if desired, with recreational facilities, schools, and nurseries here on the project. All men clirible for deferment are being duly processed.

da.


