On Nov. 1, a new law to this effect was passed by the U.S. Congress. This means that project equipment cannot be used to transport workers between their places of work and their residences or messhalls, except in cases where the project director has given specific authorization. ## SIXTH WAR LOAN BEGINS THIS WEEK, ENDS DECEMBER 16

**Goal is \$14,000,000,000**

With a fourteen billion dollar goal, the Sixth War Loan drive opened Monday and will continue until Dec. 16.

Chairman of the project drive is Ralph Brennan, assistant personnel officer, who is under Lyle Barnock, engineer, chairman for Northern Yuma County.

Five billion dollars is the quota set for individuals. The appointed personnel have been asked to purchase \$21,913.15 of War Bonds through payroll deductions or cash purchases, with regular deductions increased to 15%.

Evacuees who purchase bonds are asked to report their purchases to their block managers, anonymously, if they so desire. Applications for bonds may be had at the post office.

In connection with the drive, Project Director, quoting General Somervell, says that the choice here is between masses of men and paying in blood, or of using masses of material and paying "more heavily in dollars and sweat and fatigue, less expensively in casualties."

## BOSTON SOLDIER'S MOTHER WRITES OPEN LETTER

An open letter from a Nisei soldier's mother Mrs. Chika Sugino of Boston, appears in the November issue of the Christian Advocate, the official organ of the Methodist Church.

Commenting on the memorial services here which honored Nisei soldiers who fell in the Italian campaign, Mrs. Sugino, whose son, Arthur, is stationed at Camp Blanding, Fla., says, in part: "... beneath the serenity of the impressive... ritual, a deep hurt was felt by the families of the soldiers because they were still prohibited from the Western Command Zone..."

"... American soldiers of Japanese ancestry have a native country for which they fight, but many have no native state to welcome them back..."

"The voice of protesting justice... is soon lost in the clamoring din of jingoism

In the same issue is an editorial entitled "This Is Clear Thinking," which condemns the Western Grange-masters' resolution against Japanese return to the US Coast, regardless of loyalty. It condemns the Nebraska State Grange which unanimously protested that resolution with the following, "Be it resolved that we do not concur in any statement, the result of which might be to jeopardize the rights of citizenship of those whose ancestors came from friendly or enemy nations, particularly when it can be clearly shown that such citizens have been law-abiding and legal, giving their sons to their nation at war in as large a proportion as any other group or community."
