13 Who Fell in Italy and France

Sunday, December 3, has been set aside as a memorial day for all soldiers who have given their lives in the service of the United States during World War II, and whose families reside within the Ninth Service Command. The plan was disclosed in a communication from Major General Shedd, relayed to Project Director Mills through Lieut. Paul Stanley, commander of Service Command Unit 1995.

\$500 CIGARETTE THEFT REPORTED BY CO-OP

Five cases of cigarettes, worth \$500, were stolen last Friday night from the Co-op warehouse, Community Enterprises announced yesterday.

The theft was discovered the following morning about 9:00 o'clock. It is believed that the thief entered by removing the hinges of the door, which were later replaced.

A new shipment of knitting yarns was upset and damaged but was not taken.

\$100 reward has been offered by the C.E. for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the guilty person or persons. The local police department, under Chief Matsumoto, is conducting a thorough investigation of the matter.

Dr. French Reports on California Attitudes

Dr. David French, who recently returned from an escort trip to Los Angeles, commented on the attitude of the people there to the problems of the evacuees.

He reports: "The average man is either indifferent to the problems of the evacuees and to the possibilities of eventual return, or is sympathetic to a degree. People who were friends of the Japanese are still friends. Newcomers do not seem to care one way or the other. The people who are now making anti-evacuee propaganda are a small group. They were doing their best to be as noisy and to seem as numerous as possible. I was unable to find anyone who knew about any individual or groups who would resort to violence against evacuees in the future."

BARRACK 328-13 HIT BY FIRE LAST SUNDAY

Fire of unknown origin which began in the residence of Henry Suzuki, 328-13-G, late last Sunday afternoon, hit Apartments G, H, and part of F.

Firemen rushed to 328 in time to prevent the barrack from burning down. The fire was detected by Mrs. Larry Kaya, 13-G, who went outside when her apartment lights went out.

Government loss was not known at press time, but it is believed that personal belongings of the Suzuki family were entirely destroyed. Apartments H and F were unoccupied.

ALIEN VOLUNTEERS BEING ACCEPTED FOR MILITARY SERVICE

Volunteers Must Pass War Department Investigation

Subsequent to the decision to accept certain Japanese nationals who volunteer for military service, national Selective Service headquarters has sent a memorandum to all local boards prescribing procedure requested by the War Department for the forwarding for induction of such registrants as well as of those of Japanese extraction or parentage, national Selective Service headquarters announced late last week.

Primary requirements for induction of Japanese aliens are that they must volunteer and must be found acceptable after investigation by the War Department, and must pass the physical examination at an armed forces induction station. The determination of acceptability will be made on the basis of loyalty and other kindred factors.

SADAKICHI HARTMANN SUCCUMBS AT 74

Sadakichi Hartmann, 74, German-Japanese art critic and author, died in Florida last week, the Los Angeles Examiner said on Nov. 25.

Hartmann, who was friend to many noted personalities, was once a leader in Greenwich Village's Bohemian colony.

Married three times, he had 13 children, named the offspring of one marriage after jewels and those of another after flowers.

The veteran art critic's home was in Banning, Calif. He had gone to Florida to visit with a daughter.

SECOND ARTICLE IN EVACUEE PROPERTY SERIES DEALS WITH PERSONAL REAL ESTATE AND PROPERTY

(This is the second of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

PERSONAL REAL ESTATE

What about sale of real estate? What information must the evacuee give the Property Office in order to get speedy action?

Full information concerning the property should always be provided by the evacuee. He must supply the exact geographical location as well as a legal description of the property involved, should state by whom the title is held and whether the owner is single or married. If the property is jointly owned by several persons, he must supply authorization for the sale from all of them.

The evacuee should supply full information about the amount of annual taxes of various sorts levied against the property, the amount and type of mortgage and the terms of the mortgage; the balance due on any type of lien or other encumbrance involving the property in question, and the status of the title and whether or not a title insurance policy is held by the owner. The evacuee should also state whether fire or other types of insurance are carried and give full particulars including the name of the company, the amount and the expiration date.

REALITY REQUIREMENTS

Most real estate sales are normally made through licensed real estate brokers, of course, and the brokers are entitled to a commission on sales. While the customary fee is 5 percent, the amount of the commission may vary in certain communities or localities.

Because of the Alien Land Law, title companies require a birth certificate from the owner if he is of Japanese ancestry and so each evacuee must supply one with his request for sale of real estate.

If the evacuee has a birth certificate, he should file the original or a certified copy with the request for sale. An evacuee who has no birth certificate can write for one to the recorder of the county in which he was born. The usual fee charged by the county is \$1.00. If the evacuee wished the Property Office to get a certificate for him, he should give the Property Office his date of birth, the name of the city and county in which he was born and the necessary fee.

under prescribed conditions, certain Japanese aliens now residing in this country who are found qualified for military service was made by the War department in order to make it possible for those who desire to do so to serve in the American armed forces. In no case will a Japanese alien be inducted into the army unless he volunteers for service and his desire to volunteer must be evidenced by a request in writing signed by him.

This request, together with a personal history of the alien, will be sent to the War Department for a determination of his acceptability.

When a Japanese alien has been found acceptable for service by the War Department and the local board is so notified, it may proceed with the classification and forwarding for induction of such alien in a manner substantially the same as that prescribed for other aliens, whose acceptability also must be determined by the War Department.
