13 Killed; 46 Wounded; 2 Missing

Mrs. Riki Okanishi, 3-9-C, has been notified that her son, Pvt. Hideo Okanishi, 20, was seriously wounded in France. He is the 70th casualty from Poston, with 13 killed, 45 wounded and two missing.

Inducted in March, 1944, Pvt. Okanishi trained at Camp Blanding, Fla. Going over in September, he also saw action in Italy.

In 1942 he graduated from Delano Joint Union high school, where he was a football captain.

T/5 GEORGE KANATANI INJURES LEG IN FRANCE

The 71st casualty is T/5 George S. Kanatani, son of Mr. and Mrs. Kurataro Kanatani, 30-2-C, formerly of Redlands, Calif., who sustained a slight leg wound in action in France, Nov. 5.

He graduated from Redlands high school and San Bernardino junior college. Inducted in February, 1942, he was at Camp Robinson, Ark., Ft. Riley, Kan., and Ft. McClellan, Ala., before going overseas.

Appointed Buddhist relocation counselor in Chicago, Rev. Kubose has studied the conditions and problems of resettlement in the midwestern states and has been here to assist those who are interested in relocation to that area. On the whole, he said, the status of relocatees in that area is very encouraging. He was surprised at the variety of occupations in which they were engaged. Issei are doing very well, and some have purchased their own homes.

The community's souvenir book for Wade Head, former project director, has just been completed after about six months of work. Credit for most of the labor should go to Shoze Sasuga, Jitsuo Kurushima, Yuki-taro Kawasaki and Kojiro Nakajima, according to Ryohei Onishi of the Community Council.

Besides photographs of Mr. Head, the project, and drawings by artistically inclined members of the community, the illustrated book contains autographs of almost every evacuee in the three units.

It was displayed in Unit I earlier this week and will be on display in II until Saturday, and in III next week until Wednesday. The Council has asked Mr. Head, now superintendent of the Papago Indian Reservation at Sells, Ariz., to visit the center so that the book may be presented to him.

MARYKNOLL PLANS SPECIAL CONFERENCES

CHICAGO WEAVER PLANT WANTS 200-300 WORKERS

International Harvester Company in Chicago, which is engaged in vital war work, wants 200- to 300 workers, according to Rev. Gyomay Kubose of the Chicago Buddhist Church, who has been visiting here.

Workers at the plant are deferred if over 26 and with dependents. There are three shifts, morning, evening, and night. Minimum wages is 77¢ an hour, and 10% more is given for night shift work.

At present there are 300 Jisei working there, Rev. Kubose said, including many Bostonians. Labor relations are said to be satisfactory.

RELOCATION OFFICE TO OPEN IN PITTSBURGH

Pittsburgh, Pa.--On the recommendation of Council of Churches of Allegheny County, steps are being taken to open a WRA office in the city of Pittsburgh in the heart of the "arsenal of democracy," Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes area supervisor, announced recently.

The executive committee of the Council has unanimously endorsed the program to relocate Japanese Americans and announced its action publicly in the three daily metropolitan papers. Prominent, favorable publicity was given to the story on the front pages of the papers.

Pittsburgh, which has a population of almost 700,000 people, is a labor shortage area. It is the last of the great cities to open its door to relocation.

Little did we know then, that this war would bring the tragic death of mass evacuation... little did we know that our American citizenship meant nothing until it was proved by actual sacrifices of life on the blood field of battle.

The anxiety and emptiness at not knowing where we belonged, was the hardest bending we had to take... perhaps more than any physical changes we had to go through.

Today, three years later--it is no use to cry over the hardships of the past... Instead, let's make this experience materialize into

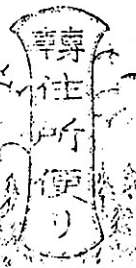
