# BOYS 18 MUST REGISTER AT UNIT I SS OFFICE

Unit Administrators Will No Longer Handle Army Draft Registration

Effective Dec. 10, 1944, all boys living in Poston who become 18 years old, will be registered under the Laws and Regulations of the National Selective Service Act in the Unit I Selective Service office. Ad. Bldg. Rm. 27 according to Herbert & Carter Selective Service representative for Yuma County.

As boys in the center become 18, they will be registered, and DSS forms No. 1 registration card, No 2, registration certificate; No. 3. Selective Service questionnaire and No 4 statement of United States citizen of Japanese ancestry will be processed in the Selective Service office.

Unit administrators will no longer take care of registration in their offices.
