

## Center Honor Roll Goes Up in Unit I

Over 800 Soldiers Are Listed

Paying tribute to the more than 800 men and women serving in the armed forces of the United States from the three units in this center, the Poston Honor Roll was set up between the Post Office and administration building in Unit I on November 31.

Measuring 21 feet, 6 inches in length and approximately 7 feet in height, the grey-painted glass-encased honor roll is to be extended with  $2\frac{1}{2}$  feet wings on either side. When completed, there will be space for more than 1,400 names.

Keeping vigil over the names is a golden American eagle, carved by Carl Yamane of Unit III. Work on the structure, which was done by evacuee carpenters, is not yet finished, and more names are to be added.

## DECEMBER ARMY CALLS ARE FOR MONDAY

### BOYS 18 MUST REGISTER AT UNIT I SS OFFICE

Unit Administrators Will No Longer Handle Army Draft Registration

Effective Dec. 10, 1944, all boys living in Poston who become 18 years old, will be registered under the Laws and Regulations of the National Selective Service Act, in the Unit I Selective Service office, Ad. Bldg. Rm. 27, according to Herbert J. Carter, Selective Service representative for Yuma County.

As boys in the center become 18, they will be registered, and DSS forms No. 1, registration card, No. 2, registration certificate, No. 3, Selective Service questionnaire, and No. 4, statement of United States citizen of Japanese ancestry, will be processed in the Selective Service office.

Unit administrators will no longer take care of registration in their offices.

### Fifty-seven Ordered to Report

Fifty-seven boys have been called from this center to report for active duty next Monday, Dec. 11, to Fort Douglas, Utah, the Selective Service office announces.

A send off program has been planned for that evening at Block 4 stage, and will begin at 7:30 o'clock. During the program, the Silver Star, which has been posthumously awarded to T/Sgt. Atsushi Sakamoto, will be presented to his parents.

Masu Kawashima will be master of ceremonies and Gyosuke Iseda will be the speaker from the Council. Other speakers had not been announced at press time.

Unit III boys are requested to be at their departure station at 6:30, Unit II boys will leave their camp at 6:45, and Unit I boys are asked to be at the stage by 7 o'clock. (cont. on Unit I page)

Presentation of the nation's third highest award will be made by Colonel Louis S. Norman and Captain George H. Preston from SCU 1921, Phoenix.

# **TADAYUKI TODAY RETURNS TO LOS ANGELES, CALIF.**

Todayuki Today, 34, head of the 52 cooking school, was back in Los Angeles last Tuesday, both the Los Angeles Examiner and Times reported on Wednesday. The Times carried a front-page photograph of Today standing before a window through which the nearby City Hall could be seen.

He first reported to the office of A. C. Warren, ACLU counsel, who represented him along with four other Japanese residents who sought permission to return to the West Coast, the newspapers said.

Volunteering for service with the US Army in World War I, Today applied for citizenship in 1937 and received his naturalization papers.

Another resident who recently returned to California was Akio S. Collier, 222-7-3. His husband is stationed at Treasure Island. She is reported to be the first Japanese to return to Fresno family.
