Conservation of Fuel Oil Necessary To Avoid Shortage

All center evacuees, as well as appointed personnel, are asked to conserve fuel oil in every possible way in order to avert the threatened shortage, reports Maurice Lipian, assistant project director.

Because of transportation difficulties, ample supply of fuel oil cannot be brought into Parker. At the present time, each shipment consists of two rail-tanks which is enough for summer needs but inadequate for winter weather.

Due to the gravity of the situation, Mr. Lipian will go to Los Angeles, probably next week to discuss this matter. Whether this shortage will last throughout the winter or will be temporary, will depend greatly upon the outcome of this conference.

It is imperative that the consumption of oil in heating stoves be reduced in every possible way and everyone is urged to make a serious effort to decrease the use of fuel oil, Mr. Lipian said.

CIGARETTE RATIONING TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

Under the conditions that prevail there are several shortages of different items which a man (and even a woman) misses very much.

To the man (or woman) who loves the lovely aroma of tobacco, there is nothing quite so lovely as the lovely aroma of tobacco.

This brings up the little matter of cigarettes which people all over the nation (including Poston) are missing.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS

Because of this shortage, smokers will be issued coupons beginning next week, which will entitle them to their share of cigarettes, pipe tobacco or Bull Durham.

The first issue of the coupons must be used before Dec. 25, as they will be void after that date. New coupons will be issued every ten days. If this system does not prove satisfactory, other methods are to be tried.

The coupon will entitle a person to purchase ten packages of cigarettes, or five packages of either pipe tobacco or Bull Durham.

EVACUEE PROPERTY PROGRAM INFORMATION, NO. 4

(Here is the fourth of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

Evacuees who wish to collect debts owed them may do so with the aid of the Property Office if they will supply complete information.

The date of the note or the date the debt was made; explanation of how and for what the debt was made (for work done, goods purchased, etc.); the original amount of the debt, rate of interest and the plan of repayment agreed upon; the balance due, name and address of the debtor; and any evidence of the debt, such as a note, mortgage, purchase contract, etc., should be given to the Property Office to speed collection.

ACCURATE DESCRIPTION: Where an evacuee wishes to rent or lease property he should supply an accurate description and the location of the property. He should specify rental rates but must keep in mind that OPA rent ceilings may apply and that where they exist rental rates cannot be raised unless proper authorization from the OPA is given. Such permission is usually hard to get. Complete details about the terms of leases, length of lease desired and other special terms should be given.

In cases where farm land is to be rented out or leased, it is important that the evacuee supply complete details about irrigation assessments, electricity bills, water district taxes, methods of determining shares when rent is desired, use of farm equipment left on the farm, building insurance as well as the evacuee's desires regarding all other leasing specifications.

Dates for payment of rent and expiration of leases should be specified. The Property Office can also help the evacuee in handling matters such as inspection of property, fire insurance, vandalism and pilferage.

Evacuees should understand that as long as the military exclusion order remains in effect the WRA will provide storage space for property left in the evacuated area or left in a center by an evacuee who either relocates or is inducted into the armed forces.

On the other hand the WRA cannot assume responsibility for the storage or care of a relocated evacuee's property at the point of relocation. The WRA will, however, assist in moving the household, personal and commercial property of evacuees going out on indefinite leave.

Any evacuee inducted into the armed forces and who wants the WRA to store property he has left in a relocation center or on the West Coast, should designate some person to represent him in dealing with the WRA.

PICKUP FORM: Any evacuee wishing to have personal or commercial property picked up and stored must fill out Form WRA - 155. The form must be filled out, signed and witnessed. It must be signed by the owner or for him by someone who holds power of attorney.

Evacuees who wish property stored by them in a commercial warehouse or in private storage transferred to a WRA warehouse must pay storage costs that have accrued before the WRA can move such property to a WRA warehouse. Warehousing receipts must be supplied by the evacuee.

Four of them are in the Mediterranean area and two of them have been wounded in action.
