have just received a clipping from your paper dated Sept. 24, 1944 concerning an arti-

cle of myself.

I am quite depressed to see only my name entioned in the article. No action of that mentioned in the article. specific type is successful without the cooperation of every person of the patrol. Therefore, I feel you did a great injustice to

others in not mentioning every man concerned.

The item above mentioned however, is secondary in my thoughts at present. In the article you also stated that I was at one time nonorably discharged from the Army because of ancestry. I do not recall to this day of ever receiving a certificate of honorable discharge

from the Army.

I shall at this time try to enlighten you to certain facts about myself. In March of '41' I was transferred to the Enlisted Reserves. Had I been discharged I would have had to me tify some draft board of my status. However, having been transferred, I could have been recalled to active duty with no red tape excep t report to the nearest military camp, post, or cantonment as I was ordered.

I hope the errors I have mentioned concerning the article will be corrected and reprinted for your readers. Also that what I have criticized will be received in a manner

correction and not ingratitude on my part.

As a former resident of Poston I thank you for your kindness in writing as you did, other than facts mentioned previously, concerning me. With no further comment, I remain,


