Pfc. Jou Okitsu Reported German Prisoner of War

Pfc. Jou Okitsu, holder of the Purple Heart and Bronze Star, is a prisoner of war of the German government, according to a report received through the International Red Cross, the War Department has informed his father, Eikichi Okitsu, 54-1-C.

Pfc. Okitsu was hurt on the Italian battlefront last Fourth of July. Awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in Italy, he was subsequently reported missing in action in France since Oct. 19.

TWO POSTONIANS AMONG 22 HONORED FOR CONDUCT

WITH 442ND COMBAT TEAM, SEVENTH ARMY, FRANCE--Two local boys were among 21 Nisei soldiers who received a 34th Infantry Division Commendation for a reconnaissance patrol, led by 2nd Lt. Francis Bianco, which reached Pisa airport in Italy.

The two are Pvt. Clement Miyaya, Denver, Colo., formerly of Blk. 27, and Pvt. Takeshi Takayama, 226-10-B. Pvt. Miyaya was reported wounded in Italy several months ago, and is now visiting his family in Chicago. Pvt. Takayama was wounded in Italy, July 6, 1944.

The citation reads, "For exceptionally meritorious conduct in combat on the 21st of July, 1944, in the vicinity of Pisa. The patrol was instructed to reconnoiter the area (Continued on Unit I page.)

MORE BOYS LEAVE TONIGHT FOR DOUGLAS

T-SGT MIYAHARA BACK FROM EUROPEAN FRONT

Arriving in time to join his family, 60-9-B, for New Year's was T/Sgt. Rex Hayao Miyahara, 24, who fought with the 442nd and was wounded at Pisa on July 7, 1944.

Struck by a shell fragment, he lost his right arm, and was hospitalized in Rome and Naples, where he was with Pvt. Raymond Matsuda. On Oct. 26, he entered Halloran General Hospital (Richmond, Va.), and later, Percy Jones General Hospital (Battle Creek, Mich.), where he was on the same floor as Pvt. Tokio Shiomichi, who he reports, is still there.

He last saw his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Shiokichi Miyahara, and two sisters in August, 1943. A volunteer from San Diego in Dec., 1941, he went over last April.

He is from Holtville, Calif., and a graduate of Holtville High, where he was active in football and track.

SECRETARY ICKES' MESSAGE TO RESIDENTS (cont.)

ROBERT DOLINS, HERE
AGAIN FROM WASHINGTON
TO DISCUSS RELOCATION

"I congratulate you upon the recognition you have received as a group and I want to express my heartfelt appreciation of the patience and understanding which the great majority of you have displayed as cooperative and law-abiding residents of relocation centers. Few groups in the population, outside of those in uniform, have made a greater personal sacrifice than you have during the past three years.

"The one-third of your original group who have left the centers have proved to you that opportunity, acceptance and personal satisfaction may be yours in states other than those which were your former homes. More important to you, however, is the fact that these 33,000 men, women, and children have proved to the Nation that they, and you, may be quiet, law-abiding and useful members of a free society when given the opportunity. Still more important to you and to your future is the almost incredible record that your sons and husbands have made fighting for this country on every battlefield of the war. Every thinking man and woman in the United States shares my pride and thankfulness for their bravery and their unstinting sacrifice to home and country.

"The announcement that the centers will of necessity be closed within one year should not be alarming to you, for many reasons. The facilities of the War Relocation Authority and the Department of the Interior will continue to be available to you for that period, and every assistance will be directed toward helping each of you to make a satisfactory resettlement in the community of your choice.

"I hope that the great majority of families in the centers will find it possible to work out acceptable relocation plans during the next few months. I think that your best opportunity will be found while war production activities and employment needs still remain at existing levels. It is my considered judgment that a wider opportunity, for most of you, lies in states east of the Sierra Nevadas, where your friends, and in many instances members of your families, are establishing new and successful homes. But, regardless of where you finally decide to relocate, all of you who leave the centers during the next several months can be assured that the War Relocation Authority will make every reasonable effort to facilitate your transition back to private life."

JUSTICE DEPT. MAY
TAKE OVER TULE LAKE

The Justice Department is expected to take over and operate the Tule Lake Segregation Center.

There are approximately 18,700 persons in Tule Lake. Of the total, about 5,000 are younger than 18 years of age and have been placed in Tule Lake because of the status of their parents or relatives.

As one of a group of personal representatives from Dillon S. Myer, one of whom is assigned to each project, Robert Dolins arrived here Friday, Dec. 29, to discuss the post-exclusion program with the project director, his staff, and the evacuee population, and to be of service in helping to interpret the program which went into effect with the opening of the West Coast on January 3. He expects to leave today.

He has talked at general and division meetings with the project director, project division chiefs, and the evacuee advisory committee for the center.

Mr. Dolins was here in the early part of December as a representative of the relocation division in Washington.

APPLICATIONS FOR IDENTIFICATION CARDS HERE

Identification cards are not required for persons returning to the evacuated area, but any person on the Army clear list desiring such a card should apply directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio of San Francisco, according to Corlies R. Carter, relocation program officer.

As a service to residents, a supply of the application forms is available in the unit relocation offices. Two recent photographs (size 1½ x 1½) and a fingerprint must be submitted with the application form. The photography department will take photographs only upon referral by the unit relocation offices, and the fingerprints may be taken in the project leave office following the photograph appointment. Development of the photographs takes approximately ten days.

WINCHELL INTERVENES

A Nisei veteran of World War II has gotten back his old job at Paramount Studios in Hollywood, through the intervention of Walter Winchell, radio and newspaper columnist.

On Dec. 3, Winchell brought the attention of his radio audience to a war veteran of Japanese ancestry, whose re-employment at Paramount was opposed by some members of a studio labor union who threatened strike. At the time, the columnist said that he himself would give the Nisei a job if Hollywood would not.

On a recent broadcast, Winchell said that the president of Paramount Pictures had taken a personal interest in the case and that the Nisei was back at work.

JOHNSONS RECEIVE MORE TRAGIC NEWS

Tragedy came again to James J. Johnson, junior cost accountant, when he received word that his father had died suddenly in Globe, Ariz., last week.

Mr. Johnson's son, Robert, was fatally injured in an accident last May, and the sudden death of an uncle occurred soon after.

Among the warmest well-wishers were a woman whose son was listed missing in the air battle over Midway, and an old school friend of Hitoshi's, a Navy veteran of the South Pacific.

The entire Nitta family is planning to leave this morning to take up residence again in Santa Ana.

CALIFORNIA PATIENTS GET GIFT OF MOCHI

Over one hundred patients of nine hospitals and sanitariums in California and Arizona will be the happy recipients of New Year's mochi which was sent out last week, according to Sakizo Yoshikawa, councilman. The mochi was contributed by every block in the three units.

The Hillcrest Sanitarium in La Crescenta, Calif., listed the largest number of patients who were hospitalized prior to evacuation, with 104. Twenty-seven are at the Norwalk, Patton, Stockton, Camarillo and Sonoma State Hospitals and Orange County Hospital in California, the Arizona State Hospital and Phoenix Indian Sanitarium in Arizona.

CIG RATION CUT TO 4 PACKS PER 10 DAYS

Although the second cigarette ration coupon allows only four packages of cigarettes or pipe tobacco for ten days, Community Enterprises disclose that a new shipment of tobacco will allow the issuance of new coupons before the expiration of ten days.

The cigarette ration will probably vary with every ticket, according to the amount of tobacco available in the canteens, so that there will be an even and fair distribution among resident smokers.

Relocating Issei and family groups who are going East to resettle in Washington, D.C., or vicinity are invited to be guests at the recently opened hostel in the Nation's capital, according to Mr. and Mrs. Parker Barrett, newly appointed directors of the hostel.

Located at 2311 Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W., only seven blocks from the White House, the hostel is sponsored and financed principally by the Washington Committee for Americans of Japanese ancestry, Inc. Members of the committee include prominent business men, educators, government officials, writers, ministers and other religious workers, trade union officials, and other community leaders. Allen J. White, executive secretary of the Washington Friends Meeting and teacher, is chairman of the hostel sub-committee.

"Our primary concern is to make the Washington hostel a comfortable and friendly temporary residence for newly-arrived resettlers, particularly Issei and family groups," Mr. Barrett said.

LUNT AND FONTANNE ASK OVATION FOR NISEI

A U.S. ARMY HOSPITAL, England--Actress Lynn Fontanne and her actor-husband, Alfred Lunt, halted their entertainment program and called for silence. Lunt walked out into the audience and asked five wounded soldiers to come to the stage with him.

"This is Pearl Harbor day," Lunt said. "And, here are five Japanese Americans who showed their loyalty to the United States by volunteering for service. They showed further proof of their loyalty in the fighting in Italy and in France where they were wounded. They deserve our thanks and praise."

The ovation from the wounded buddies of the Nisei soldiers shook the rafters, the Associated Press reported.

arms and 88 artillery fire, through territory covered by enemy observation and patrol, over difficult terrain, flat and without cover or concealment from enemy observation and traversed by four canals that had to be swum across, the patrol of 22 men safely made a one-day reconnaissance that covered 30 miles. The skill and ability of the members of the patrol contributed to the successful accomplishment of the mission for which the patrol had been designated. Their actions were exemplary and a credit to the Armed Forces of the United States."

ST. LOUIS (MO.) PAPER SHOWS LIBERAL VIEWPOINT

Two clippings from the St. Louis (Mo.) Post-Dispatch have been received by the Chronicle from Matsu Yoshio of St. Louis, formerly a Unit II Chronicle worker.

The first is a recent editorial entitled "Fair Play for Japanese Americans" commending the exclusion lift announcement as "a step...taken toward righting a gross violation of civilian liberties," but adding that "more than this is necessary before justice is fully done."

The editorial, aware of "professional anti-Japanese agitation" and "reactionaries," concludes by recommending that, "A big job of

education in fair play and tolerance needs to be done on the West Coast, to assure these American citizens of their rights."

The second clipping is of a column by Lowell Mellett, who retells the story of the rescue of the "Lost Battalion" by Japanese American soldiers, and adds facts about other Nisei who are active in the Pacific theatre of war.

Commenting on the revocation of the evacuation orders, Mellett discusses the "real problem" confronting Americans, a "test of American liberalism on our own premises" with a world fighting for freedom looking on.
