Discharged Poston Vet Accepted As Hollywood Legion Post Member

One of the first Japanese-American World War II veterans to become a member of the American Legion is Santa Ana-born Harley Oka of Poston who has joined Hollywood Post No. 591. He was discharged last month from the Army for medical reasons.

Appearing in Monday(s issue of both the Los Angeles Times and Examiner were pictures of Oka and several other evacuees returning to the Coast, who were shown being greeted by Mayor Fletcher Bowron.

Others from Poston in the pictures were Mary, Jack and Henry Yoshimizu of Block 2, who, according to the Examiner's story, plan to go East soon

A former Hollywood businessman, he ottained permission from the WRA to return to the Coast. The 28-year old graduate of Huntington Beach, High School and Woodbury Business College in Los Angeles, was among 34 World War II veterans recently sworn into the Hollywood Post by Post Commander William Schneider, (cont. Ten Families Scheduled To Leave Next Monday For Crystal City, Texas

Scheduled to leave Monday, Jan. 22, for Crystal City, Tex., are ten families, totalling 45 persons.

Will Combine With Block 5 February 1

Orders to close Block 12 mess hall were issued by Project Director Duncan Mills at the administrative staff meeting last Block 12, with a popu-lation of 113, will combine with Block 5, which also has a depleted population. The order is effective Jan. 29.

Mess halls serving less than 125 residents will be investigated by a special committee, to determine whether they should be combined.

At present, Blks. 12, 15, 21, 207, 209, 221, and 310 come under this category.

The local councils and the Community Council Food Committee have all protested vigorously against combining mess halls, which will mean reduction in mess workers. The majority of councilmen feel that since relocation centers will close within the year, this action is unnecessary.

MANZANAR OFFICIAL SAYS FIVE HAVE GONE WEST

Only about five persons have gone back from Manzanar on indefinite leave to their California homes, and one additional family

is planning to go back, said Walter Heath, Manzanar relocation program officer on his visit here this week.

He came here as an escort to an excludee, as it is ruled that excludees must have travel permits and escorts within the restricted area.

Many persons, including several farmers, have gone from that center to California on short term leave, he said. He believed that when these return, the movement will start.

Clarification of Dates:

Midnight, Jan. 2 is the date that revocation of mass exclusion orders became effective. Cleared evacuees may leave immediately for the West Coast; they do not have to wait until Jan 20, which is the date that the Army will rovoke orders on centers in the Western Defense Command, designated as military areas. They will remain in effect until then so that the War Dept. may complete its investigations. Status of Visitors:

All visitors whose applications for reinduction were pending at the time when revocation of exclusion orders was announced, or who have subsequently applied, cannot be reinducted. subsequently applied, cannot be Special cases will be carefully considered.

Relocation of Unattached Minors: In view of the Endo decision, unattailed children or children wishing to relocate w out being accompanied by or going to reponsi-ble relatives cannot be refused permission if they are chared. However, WRA has a moral responsibility here, and minors and older family members are advised to consult Family Welfare regarding state laws governing interstate placement of hildren. Minors must also have an approved relocation plan to qualify for relocation assistance, and because of their dependency, are urged not to leave until such a plan has been developed.

Travel Assistance:
1, Relocated equoces eligible for are grants only if the are returning to the state or portion of state from which they were eva-However, in cases where the family cuated. head was evacuated from one state and his dependents from another, dependents may receive grants to accompany him to his former home.

2. Visitors cannot apply at centers for travel assistance for return to the Coast. They must apply to the field officer nearest the point they resided before visiting the center.

3. Travel grants for relocatees returning to the Coast will cover the most direct routing between the present residence and the Coast destination. Any additional travel involved will be made at their own expense.

Arrangements are being made to provide transportation reimbursement for automobile eligible relocatees returning to the Coast. . Housing Requirements for Relocation Planning:

Because of the acute housing shortage on the Coast and the difficulties experienced by those returning without prior housing plans, WRA will require evacuees to show evidence of such plans before approving their relocation plan. These arrangements may, be temporary, but should be for a long enough period to permit the evacuee to obtain permanent housing.

Travel Permits for Hawaii and Alaska:
All evacuees desiring to travel to Hawaii or Alaska should submit requests to the Japanese American Branch, Office of the Provost Marshal General, Presidio, San Francisco, Calif.

Leave Clearance:

WRA is now out of the leave clearance business. All future determinations on freedom of movement of individual evacuees will be made either by the War Dept. or the Dept. of Justice.

* SOLDIERS* DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

With the Lifting of the ban, location will be speeded up. Among those relocating will be many remilies with sons and husbands in the armed forces. For the benefit of those who will be eligible to receive family allowances as dependents, a series of articles dealing with such payments for soldiers dependents will be published. A copy of the pamphlet from which the following information is taken is available at the selective service office to any enlisted man or inductee awaiting call.

Class A Dependents—The lawful wife of a soldier, his children, and a former wife divorced

dier, his children, and a former wife divorced who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable. Also, a wife living separate and apart from soldier under court order or written agreement providing for maintenance or support. These need only prove relationship. - LAWFUL WIFE includes wife living in soldier's household, wife living separate and apart, a ad common-law wife if marriage was contracted in a state in which common-law marriges were recognized when such marriage was established. - FORMER WIFE DIVORCED includes only the for-

mer wife who has not remarried and to whom ali-

mony: is still payable.

. CHILD includes soldier's legitimate child, adopted child, stepchild of a member of the man's household, ellegitimate child if the reequired proof of paternity is submitted, and any child to whom he has stood in loop parentis (in place of parent) for at least one year prior to the date of application. To be elibible, a child must be unmarried, under 16, or of any age if uncapable of self-support by reason mental or physical defect.

NOTE -- The husband and child of an enlisted woman are eligible only if they are dependent

upon her for chief support.

Class B Dependents -- Parents and minor brothere and sister are defined below, who are dependent upon soldier for their chief support.

· PARENT includes father, mother, grandfather, grandmother; stepfather, stepmother, father and mother through adoption, either of the solution or of his spouce, and persons, who for a period of not less than, I year prior to the man's emlistment or induction, stood in loco through to the soldier. No more than 1000 parentis to the soldier. No more than two parents are eligible for an allowance based on the service of one soldier.

BROTHER AND SISTER include brothers and sisters of the half blood as well as of the whole blood, stepbrothers, stepsisters, and brothers and sisters through adoption. To be eligible, a brother or sister must be unmarried and un-der 18; or of any age if incapable of self-

support by reason of mental or physical defect.
