## 1st Lt. Shig Yasutake, South Pacific Veteran, Visits Sister in Unit II

A Southwest Pacific veteran, 1st Lt. Shig Yasutake, 30, now Co. E commander at Ft. Snelling, visited his sister, Mrs. Gisuke Shiratsuki, 214-10-C, this week.

Yasutake, who holds the Bronze Star, returned to the states last October after two years overseas with the G-2, 43rd Inf. He was stationed in the Solomons and was on Russell's Island, in the Munda campaign on New Georgia, on Guadalcanal, New Caledonia and Vella Lavella in the Bougainville sector.

At Vella Lavella, he received orders to attend OCS at Ft. Benning, Ga. Among his letters of commendation is one from General Harmon, U.S. army commander in the South Pacific, who cites him for meritorious service between June 30-Aug. 5, 1943, when he was a technical sergeant. He was praised for a "distinct contribution to military intelligence" and aiding "materially in the success of the operations."

A graduate of Gardena (Calif.) High School, Yasutake was inducted in Jan., 1943, and had basic training at Ft. Ord, Calif. Later he was transferred to Ft. Custer, Mich. Prior to induction, he was engaged in the produce business.

Three brothers, Yas, George and Hick, all privates first class, have begun MIS training at Ft. Snelling. His parents are at Rohwer.

Mr. Ito has a son, Pfc. Lloyd, who was wounded in France last October, and a son-in-law, Pfc. Frank Wada, is also serving in the army. He has a daughter in California who is married to a Caucasian.

JA FISHERMEN MAY RESUME COAST FISHING

Japanese - American fishermen who are returning to their former homes on the Pacific Coast from relocation centers have the assurance of the WRA and the Coast Guard that they will get their vessels back and be allowed to resume fishing under the same regulations that affect other fishermen, the Phoenix Gazette said on Jan. 13.

Dillon Myer, WRA director, said in a press conference that federal agencies will protect the rights of the evacuees, and that anti-Japanese feeling on the Coast has decreased materially, the story added.

SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS NO. II, HOW TO APPLY

1. How Is Application Made?

(a) Application should be made only on official form (WD AGO) Form No. 625. These forms are available at Army reception centers, Army recruiting stations, American Red Cross chapters, service command headquarters, and the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, New Jersey.

(b) Documentary evidence should accompany all applications, and no payments may be made until the evidence has been submitted and approved. There is one exception: if soldier serving in Alaska or outside the continental United States files application for class A dependents without attaching such evidence, payment may be authorized. Evidence should, however, be submitted as soon as practicable within six months, or payments will be stopped. (All required evidence for a Class B or B-1 dependent must be submitted with the application.)

(c) All questions on the form must be answered.

2. Who Should File The Application?

(a) The soldier himself should apply for the family allowance, if practicable. He should file application with his commanding officer. Official application form (WD AGO) Form No. 625) will be given him at the reception center. He should follow carefully the simple instructions printed on form and, if possible, attach all required documentary proof of claims of relationship and dependency.

(b) Dependents may apply but it is best for the soldier to apply. His wife or child (also a divorced wife who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable) may receive this benefit with or without his consent. But class B-1 and class B dependents may receive it only if the soldier agrees.

3. Where Is Application Sent After It Is Filled Out?

(a) Instructions are printed on the final page of the four-page form. A civilian applying should retain copy marked Applicant's Copy and instruction sheet and mail remaining pages of form to the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, New Jersey. Soldier should retain Applicant's copy and instruction sheet of form and turn in remaining pages to his commanding officer, who will forward them to the ODB.

(b) Civilians should be sure to put sufficient postage on their envelopes in mailing applications and evidence. Three cents' postage is not always sufficient. (To be continued)

### TEN PERSONS A DAY MAY HAVE PASSES TO PHOENIX

Director Mills announced this week that two-day trips by residents to Phoenix for the purpose of transacting personal business have been authorized, with ten persons a day being granted passes.

### CENTERS MAY CLOSE BY JUNE 30, THIS YEAR

All WRA centers except those maintained solely for persons of Japanese ancestry whose loyalty is questionable, would be closed by June 30 under a bill introduced to the House, Jan. 18, by Representative Dworshak (Republican) of Idaho, according to an AP dispatch.

Dworshak said in a statement that although Secretary Ickes anticipated the closing of the centers within one year, there is an immediate need for the war effort of Japanese-Americans and WRA personnel. There are some 2,500 of the latter, Dworshak said.

### LETTER "B" GOOD FOR TOBACCO NEXT WEEK

From tomorrow to Saturday, Jan. 27, letter "B" on the tobacco ration cards will be good for either six pkgs. cigarettes or four pkgs. pipe tobacco.

Letter "A" will be void after today.

Five of the ten will be from Unit I, two from II, and three from III.

The following procedure will apply:

(a) Until further notice, eligibility for the pass will be limited to those to whom the War Dept. has granted complete freedom of movement.

(b) Applications must be made at least one week in advance to the unit administrators, who will submit the names directly to the project leave office. Passes will be prepared and held for the persons concerned, who will pick them up as they leave.

(c) Persons must make their own arrangements for housing in Phoenix.

(d) Persons under 21 must have written consent of their parents.

(e) The leave office will be responsible for notifying the appropriate US Attorney in cases of aliens, and the Immigration and Naturalization Service in case of parolees.

All passes to Phoenix which require more than two days' absence from the center, as well as those for medical or dental care, will be handled through the unit relocation offices as before.

### WEST COAST FEDERAL

Eligible persons wishing federal employment in the evacuated area are advised to submit their applications to the 12th Civil Service District in San Francisco for California and Arizona, or the 11th District in Seattle for Oregon and Washington, according to John H. Provinse, acting WRA director.

Several government agencies formerly employing evacuees on the West Coast have

inquired as to the availability of past employees, Provinse said.

Meanwhile, the Los Angeles Daily News reported on Jan. 17, that the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors had "reconted" on its recent stand against returning Japanese to county jobs.

A new motion by Supervisor John Anson Ford, who "explained smoothly" that the previous statement was

"all informal", was passed, and now "the board recognizes the legal rights of Japanese who were county employees under civil service, and the board recognizes the stand of the FBI and military authorities in authorizing the return of the Japanese, and the board will place no barriers in the way of immediate return of such employees to their jobs," the Daily News said.

In the following message to residents, Director Duncan Mills explains the two forms of assistance, advisory and financial, which the WRA is providing in planning the closure of the centers and the re-establishment of people in normal communities. Financial aid will be provided to those whose relocation plans are approved by the relocation division. All families are advised to discuss their plans with the relocation division or welfare section at the earliest possible date.

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Financial aid will be given as follows to those whose relocation plans are approved:

1. Transportation to the place of resettlement.
2. In case of need, \$3 per day per family member to cover cost of meals on the journey.
3. In case of need, \$25 per family member to assist in re-establishment.
4. Transportation of household goods, personal effects, and to a limited extent, commercial property.

ADVISORY ASSISTANCE

1. Accurate, expert advice as to the use of resources of the community to which the family relocates.
2. Information concerning travel.
3. Assistance in bringing together family members who have been separated.
4. Information about government agencies which can aid resettlers.

APPOINTMENT FOR INTERVIEWS

Appointments are being made for discussions with the relocation and welfare departments on a day-to-day basis, as they have been in the past. However, families do not have to wait for appointments. They may consult the unit relocation offices at any time.

Families or individuals who cannot support themselves should discuss their problems with the welfare counselors at the earliest possible time. Those facing this situation can rest assured that arrangements can be made for their resettlement with complete security.

LEAVE REGULATIONS

It is no longer necessary to apply for indefinite leave.

Persons desiring WRA assistance should consult the relocation offices. Assistance will be given, departure arrangements made, and a gate pass prepared. The gate pass can be picked up at the departure station as they leave.

Persons who do not want WRA assistance should make their request at the leave office where a gate pass will be issued. However, in deciding to leave without WRA aid, they forfeit their right to transportation and assistance grants and other WRA assistance.

Persons wishing to leave the center for a short period of time for adequate reasons may do so. Arrangements for such passes should be made at the relocation offices.

### NITTA HOMECOMING TOLD IN LONG BEACH PAPER

The welcome given by Methodist church members to the Nitta family of Poston on their return to Santa Ana, Calif., was described at length in the Jan. 8 issue of the Long Beach Press Telegram.

"The Nittas were welcomed yesterday," the story said, "with a brief sermon on racial tolerance. After services, the churchgoers crowded to shake their hands."

According to the article, the Nittas had stopped for food only once on the trip from Poston to Santa Ana, and that at the home of a Methodist minister in Indio. "We didn't want to cause trouble," Shosuke Nitta was quoted as saying.

Living in a shack on the edge of their property, the Nittas are giving the tenants of their ranch six months to evacuate. Meanwhile they plan "to fix up the place a little."

### UNIT I TEACHERS TO TEACH IN UNIT II

To alleviate the teacher shortage in Unit II schools, several from Unit I will devote part of their time to Unit II, according to Dr. A.L. Harris, superintendent of education.

Several new teachers are expected to arrive soon, he said.

### LA DEPUTY ATTORNEY HERE ON BUSINESS

### SUPREME COURT'S APPROVAL OF EVACUATION WAS "LEGALIZATION OF RACISM" DAYS JUSTICE MURPHY

In THE OPEN FORUM, bulletin of the Southern California branch of the American Civil Liberties Union, for Dec. 30, Jan. 6 and 13, is contained a review of the Supreme Court decisions which rendered unconstitutional the detention of an American citizen in a relocation center, solely because of ancestry, and upheld the validity of evacuation as a military necessity.

Especially emphasized by the FORUM, is a paragraph from Justice Frank Murphy, who along with Justices Jackson and Douglas, dissented from the Supreme Court's approval of the exclusion of Japanese from the West Coast as a military necessity.

### DOMESTIC POSITIONS OPEN IN CALIFORNIA

Six job offers received here recently from California were all for domestics. Interested persons should contact their respective relocation offices.

Three of the offers were for couples. One was from near Pasadena, one from Beverly Hills, and one from Hollywood.

Three of the offers were for single persons. One was from San Francisco, one was from Helena, Calif., which is near San Francisco, and one was from San Francisco.

Wages vary from \$125 to \$200 a month for couples, while the San Francisco job for a single person offers \$100 a month.

The paragraph follows: "I dissent therefore, from this legalization of racism. Racial discrimination in any form and in any degree has no justifiable part whatever in our democratic way of life. It is unattractive in any setting, but it is revolting among a free people who have embraced the principles set forth in the Constitution of the United States. All residents of this nation are kin in some way by blood or culture to a foreign land. Yet they are primarily and necessarily a part of the new and distinct civilization of the United States. They must accordingly be treated at all times as the heirs of the American experiment and as entitled to all the rights and freedoms guaranteed by the Constitution."

Branches of the ACLU on the Coast will assist the many other agencies in straightening out problems of the return of the Japanese-American and alien population, the OPEN FORUM also reported.

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The writer has been living in the Milwaukee, Wisc. district for a period of a little over a half year, and feels like a veteran middle westerner. For the benefit of those residents of Poston who are not planning to return to the west coast and who might be contemplating the possibilities of relocating in the middle west, I thought I'd scribble some of my impressions of this locality during my short residence in this district.

First of all, I have noticed that the sentiment here is just plain wonderful. The people on the streets, in the shops in the street cars, in the government offices or public places have been really friendly. The reputation of the people of Japanese ancestry here has been worked up gradually, and it may be frankly said that we are accepted in the category of above the average class of people. No matter where one goes, he or she is treated with sincere courtesy.

All this has been due to many things. For one thing, the leading newspaper of Milwaukee, the Journal, has been giving the Japanese-Americans very good publicity. It is rare that a week passes by without some news of benefit to us appearing either in the news column or in the editorials. Then the 100th Infantry trained at nearby Camp McCoy and received much favorable publicity. The Nisei Council here has been very active in the promotion of good will, as have been other organizations as the YMCA, the Kiwanis Club etc.
