JA FISHERMEN MAY RESUME COAST FISHING

Japanese - American fishermen who are returning to their former homes on the Pacific Coast from relocation centers have the assurance of the WRA and the Coast Guard that they will get their vessels back and be allowed to resume fishing under the same regulations that affect other fishermen, the Phoenix Gazette said on Jan. 13.

Dillon Myer, WRA director, said in a press conference that federal agencies will protect the rights of the evacuees, and that anti-Japanese feeling on the Coast has decreased materially, the story added.

SOLDIERS' DEPENDENCY BENEFITS

How Is Application Made?

(a) Application should be made only on official form (WD AGO) Form No. 625. These forms are available at Army reception centers, Army recruiting stations, American Red Cross chapters, service command headquarters, and the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Newark 2, New Jersey.

(b) Documentary evidence should accompany all applications, and no payments may be made until the evidence has been submitted and approved. There is one ex-ception: if soldier serving in Alaska or outside the continental United States files

application for class A dependents without attaching such evidence, payment may be authorized. Evidence should, however, be submitted as soon as practicable with&n six months, or payments will be stopped. (All required evidence for a Class B or B-1 dependent must be submitted with the application.)

(c) All questions on the form must be ans -

wered.

(b) Dependents may apply but it is best for

the soldier to apply. His wife or child (also a divorced wife who has not remarried and to whom alimony is still payable) may receive this benefit with or without his consent. But class B-1 and class B dependents may receive

it only if the soldier agrees.

) Instructions are printed on the final page of the four-page form. A civilian applying should retain copy marked Applicant's Copy and instruction sheet and mail remaining pages of form to the Office of Dependency Benefits, 213 Washington St., Neward 2, New Jersey. Soldier should retain Applicant's copy and instruction sheet of form and turn in remaining pages to his commanding officer, who will forward them to the ODB.

(b) Civilians should be sure to put sufficient postage on their envelopes in mailing applications and evidence. Three cents' postage is not always sufficient. (To be continued)

APPOINTMENT FOR INTERVIEWS

... Appointments are being made for discussions with the relocation and welfare departments on a day-bo-day basis, as they have been in the past. However, families do not have to wait for appointments. They may cansult the unit relocation offices at any time.

Families or individuals who cannot support

themselves should discuss their problems with the walfare counselors at the earliest possible time. Those facing this situation can rest assured that arrangements can be made for their resettlement with complete security.

LEAVE REGULATIONS

It is no longer necessary to apply for indefinite leave.

Persons desiring WRA assistance should consult the relocation offices. Assistance will be given, departure arrangements made, and a gate pass prepared. The gate pass can be picked up at the Reparture station as they leave.

Persons who do not want WRA assistance should make their request at the leave office where a gate pass will be issued. However, in deciding to leave without WRA aid, they forfeit their

right to transportation and assistance grants and other WRA assistance.

Persons wishing to leave the center for a short period of time for adequate reasons may do so. Arrangements for such passes should be made at the relocation offices.

According to the article, the Nittas had stopped for food only once on the trip from Poston to Senta Ana, and that at the home of a Methodist minis ter in Indio. "We didn't want to cause trouble," Shosuke Nitta WAS quoted as saying.

Living in a shack on the edge of their pro-perty, the Nittas are giving the tenants of their ranch six months to evacuate. Mean-while they plan "to fix up the place a little."

For the benefit of those residents of Poston who are not plan-ning to return to the coast and who west might be contemplating the possibilities of relocating in the middle west, I thought It scribble some of my impressions of this locality during my short residence in this district.
