### Posthumous DSC Awarded To Pfc. Harry Madokoro

Killed in action in Italy last August, Pfc. Harry F. Madokoro, 32, from Watsonville, Calif., has been posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross for "extraordinary heroism in action" on two occasions. Madokoro was chief of police in Unit II before he volunteered for service. His mother, Mrs. Matsu Madokoro, lives at 213-13-G.

### Mills Approves Manpower Commission Recommendation

It has been decided that reduced kitchen quotas set by Washington will be met by April 1, by not replacing workers who terminate. No one now working will be terminated.

The Manpower Commission recommendation to this effect has been approved by Project Director Mills, with one limitation. That is, if normal losses have not brought any block down to quota by April 1, surplus workers will be given terminations at that time.

More than 300 workers in the three units are involved in the quota reduction. It is estimated that this will mean an average of five workers below the present employment level in each block.

Where two mess halls are consolidated, the new consolidated kitchen will be limited to the Washington quota. For example, instead of 30 workers in consolidated kitchen 5-12, there will be 26.

One other Manpower Commission recommendation has been accepted by Director Mills as a working basis. This (cont. on Unit I page)

PFC. HARRY MADOKORO WINS POSTHUMOUS DISTINGUISHED SERVICE CROSS

Italy...during the final assault on an enemy held hill, Pfc. Madokoro advanced ahead of his squad to a strategic position from which he could deliver effective automatic rifle fire. Partly exposed to enemy fire, he scanned his sector of the slope for targets. He leveled his automatic rifle on a

nest of snipers, forcing them to disperse. Throughout the bitter fight he held his position, neutralizing another enemy nest and pinning down the enemy to enable his platoon to take the hill.

to fire on the enemy entrenched on the outskirts of the town. With heavy fire directed at him, he stubbornly held his position and provided covering fire when his squad was forced to withdraw because of a concentrated artillery and mortar barrage. The following day, when his squad became separated from the remainder of the company within the town, Pfc. Madokoro provided flank protection against determined enemy attacks. A group of enemy soldiers entered a nearby draw and threw hand grenades at him, but Pfc. Madokoro crawled toward the draw and tossed a grenade into the enemy position. On another occasion he left his position and silenced a machine pistol position with a grenade. Still later in the course of the battle, he approached an enemy machine gun nest and silenced it by firing from a kneeling position. By his stubborn determination, conspicuous devotion to duty and courage, Pfc. Madokoro inspired his squad in preventing the enemy's escape while his company closed in to occupy the town."

The difference between "Initial" and "Regular Monthly" family allowances, and how soon they are payable:

1. The Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended, provides for the payment of an INITIAL family allowance to certain dependents of enlisted men who entered the service on or after Nov. 1, 1943. This initial family allowance payment is contributed entirely by the government, and no deduction is made from the soldier's pay.

Application for an initial family allowance must be made by the soldier within 15 days after entering active duty on pay status.

An initial family allowance payment is made only to class A dependents (wife and children) and class B-1 dependents (parents, brothers, and sisters who are dependents upon the soldier for chief support).

The initial family allowance payment covers the month in which the soldier entered the service, and is mailed from the finance office at the station to which the soldier is assigned.

2. Regular MONTHLY payments of family allowance will be made by the Office of Dependency Benefits, Newark 2, New Jersey, if documentary evidence of relationship or dependency supporting the soldier's sworn statements is submitted to and approved by that office. On the basis of the evidence, the Office of Dependency benefits will determine whether payment of monthly family allowance is warranted, and the amount to be paid in accordance with the provisions of the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended. In some cases the regular monthly amount may be different from the amount of the initial payment.

Dependents who receive an initial allowance will not receive a monthly allowance for the same month. The regular monthly allowance is "earned" during the calendar month after the soldier entered the Army and is payable after it is earned. For example: If the soldier enters the Army March 3, and his dependents receive the initial family allowance March 10, the regular monthly family allowance, if approved by the Office of Dependency Benefits, will be "earned" during April and will not be payable until May. Thereafter regular monthly checks will be mailed after the end of the month in which they are "earned."

EXCERPTS FROM POST-EXCLUSION BULLETIN NO. 3

Issued by Acting WRA Director John H. Provins

Alien Travel Permits: For a short period after Dec. 17, some U.S. attorneys believed they had no authority to issue travel permits to Japanese aliens from travel to the evacuated area. This misunderstanding has been corrected, and all U.S. attorneys have been instructed that they may issue permits in such cases, if the individual is not an excludee.

Eligibility of Reinductees For Relocation Assistance: The provision that all relocated evacuees must secure advance approval of the area relocation office for returning to a center went into effect July 20, 1943. Consequently, all center residents reinducted or admitted without such approval at any time after that date are ineligible for relocation assistance. Those previously inducted are eligible on the same basis as other center residents.

Modifications of Visiting Policy: Two changes in the policy governing visitors have been approved. The first will make it possible for members of the armed forces on furlough or awaiting call to active duty to visit the centers. They were previously omitted through inadvertence. The second will broaden the policy covering visits for relocation planning purposes, so as to include evacuees who need to visit the centers to develop plans with potential associates in business or agricultural enterprises. However, it is still required that the visit must be requested by the center residents with whom the planning is to be done.

Denial of Admission To Visitors At The Gate: In most cases where evacuees appear outside center gates asking permission to visit without advance approval, they will be admitted temporarily and processed. However, if they do not fall into any of the approved visitor categories the Project Director is authorized at his own discretion to deny admission.

Group Relocation: The ruling that "approval will not usually be given (for travel assistance covering investigatory trips) where more than three families are to reside on contiguous farms or in an immediate neighborhood" has been dropped. However, WRA will continue to discourage the relocation of groups consisting of more than six families except in cases where the relocation officer feels it might be advisable.

Social Visits: Evacuees living in nearby communities may not visit the centers over weekends for social purposes. However, in cases where an evacuee in a nearby community has valid reasons to visit the center for relocation planning, and where his presence is requested by center residents, he may be admitted.

NEW YORK JAPANESE HOLD BALL FOR ALLIED RELIEF

New York--About 350 persons attended an Allied Relief Ball sponsored recently by the Japanese American Committee of the New York War Fund at the Hotel McAlpin, one of the city's leading hotels.

Among those present were resettlers, long-resident local Japanese, about 50 Nisei soldiers from Hawaii and the mainland, and 100 Caucasian friends. One of the guests was Sono Osato, famous dancer who is currently being featured on Broadway in "On The Town."

Receipts, to go to the New York War Fund, totalled \$250 from the sale of tickets and of a Directory of Japanese Americans in New York, which was prepared by the War Fund Committee. The directory includes the names, addresses and telephone numbers of 125 individuals, and various church and business organizations. Dr. Kanzo Oguri, prominent Brooklyn physician, is chairman of the Japanese American War Fund Committee.

WRA RETRACTS RECENT REINSTATEMENT RULING

Patients hospitalized in Phoenix Hospitals for over one month and soldiers receiving honorable discharges at Ft. Douglas, Utah, will no longer be charged for subsistence and room on their return here, as they have been since Jan. 2.

Because of complaints which arose out of the Washington ruling which stated that such persons could not be reinstated, the Community Council recently sent a protest to WRA Washington through Project Director Mills, and approval has been received here to have the order retracted.

### DONATIONS RECEIVED BY HOSPITAL LIBRARY

Several books, children's games, several hundred magazines, and \$6.75 in cash for Library Fund, were recent holiday drive of the Boston Hospital Patients' Library, according to Mrs. Donnell W. Boardman, volunteer hospital librarian, who expressed thanks to everyone who contributed. The Library Fund is the only fund with which new books and supplies can be bought.

Special appreciation, said Mrs. Boardman, is due to girls of the Senior Girl Scout Troop of Mrs. Robert McLane, who have been doing volunteer library work two afternoons a week, and mounting pictures for a picture loan collection for the patients from which the latter may borrow pictures to brighten up the walls of the wards and rooms.

Donations of books and magazines, and contributions to the Library Fund, will still be gladly received. Greatest needs are: Japanese language books for patients in the contagious wards who cannot borrow books from the community libraries, and who must spend months in bed with almost nothing to read; and good and recent English books also for the "permanent collection" in the contagious wards. If one has a Japanese book with which he is finished, and which he would like to share with a great many people who would really appreciate having it to read, he is asked to bring it to the Hospital Library.

This is a city of about 1,000,000, but the main business and shopping district is very concisely located within an area of just about 10 blocks square. Within this area are located the two R.R. stations, the court house, post offices, police dept., motor vehicle dept., majority of the theaters and hotels, most of the large department stores, number of factories, and countless number of business concerns of all kinds. One is able to cover the whole main section of the city as a pedestrian within a few hours. I have never seen any city of this size with such a concise and compact main business section. This fact brings to one's mind the question of highly congested traffic. Well, it is peculiar, but there is just one street, the Wisconsin Avenue, on which both traffic and pedestrians decrease to a point that one would think it was a suburb.

Travel facilities are better than the average under the circumstances. There are street cars and trackless trolleys on practically every street for local service, and motor busses running day and night to the outskirts of the city. A \$1.00 weekly pass allows one to travel anywhere within the city limits, and a \$1.50 pass takes one to the suburbs within a radius of 20 miles. Two railroad systems run to Chicago, the trains coming and going at practically hourly intervals and for about \$2.00 fare. (continued)

With Morinishi dropping the ball through the hoop and garnering rebounds by the handful throughout the second half, the Blackbirds kept out in front with little trouble. Final score: 30-22.\*
